CLOSE OF THE SESSION.

The Legislature closed its session on Saturday with a good deal of work accomplished in comparatively brief space of time. Our wise men can hardly be charged with having dawdled over their work. Thirty-nine days—almost a Lenten season—elapsed from the beginning to the close of their task. Within that period there were five Sundays, five Saturdays Good Friday and Easter Monday, on which rest was taken, and deducting these twelve days there were twenty-seven left for work.

Within that time some thirty-nine Bills were passed into law, the necessary moneys were voted for the public service for the coming nine months, the expenditures of the past year were discussed and a strong expression of opinion was made in favor of having more money to expend in our future provincial housekeeping. The Guardian sincerely hopes that this may be obtained at an early day, if it can be had on fair and equitable terms.

Throughout the session a most accommodating spirit was displayed. The prohibitionists wanted some amendment to their favorite law and they got it. The Trolley Car Company wanted a charter, and got it. The Telephone Company wanted an extended term for its contract and obtained it. The City Council wanted further borrowing powers and these were granted. They also wanted indemnification against possible consequences for some things done in the past, and they were made secure. L. P. Tanton thought he ought to be reimbursed for some law costs and he was not denied.

The new born babe the newly wedded pair and the dying were legislated for, and henceforth their entrance upon life, their promotion and their final exit will receive official recognition. Thought was given to the pupils at school. Legislative care was extended to bird and beast and even the mute oyster, in the bed to which he has so long been confined, had new and probably unexpected protection extended to him.

And what shall we say more? We may congratulate Premier Peters and his Government on having safely passed through the one month in the twelfth which it would at the worst have been possible to suffer defeat and deposition. They are safe for an indefinite number of months to come, until at a time to be chosen by themselves, fresh and vigorous with rest, animated by hope and incited by desire, they may enter upon the unknown perils of another session. We congratulate the leader of the Opposition, on the fealty of his followers, which enabled him at last to lead out of the House at prorogation the same unbroken phalanx that listened to His Honor's opening speech. In the strenuous party battle, against superior numbers he did not lose a man.

And we congratulate the members individually on their temporary release from the more urgent cares of state which are "thorns upon the brow" on their return to their hearths and homes, their loving wives and prattling little ones, with no malodorous salary grab in their pockets. They might have done worse—much worse than they did while in Charlottetown. We congratulate the country, too, on the prorogation. Taxes are not laid on during a recess. The

country is a little safer when the House is not in session.

Finally we congratulate the newspapers upon whose clever scribes the session imposes some special duties and responsibilities. It is a task to condense so much wisdom into the limited space available in an Island newspaper, and even when so condensed it leaves much less space for other matters. Not that our legislators are needlessly loquacious or long winded. There is no legislative body in Canada that transacts more business in the same time than ours, or with less needless debate. Still we are glad it is over, and gratified that in what was done there was something for everybody.

HELP THE FAMINE SUFFERERS.

The Summerside Pioneer asks the question, Shall Prince County help the starving Japs? and answers it cordially in the affirmative. Among the early subscribers to the Famine Fund were residents and fraternal organizations of Prince County. All the counties of the Province are represented in the list, and those who have subscribed have done generously, but we hope yet to hear from many more.

The fact that other calamities have happened in Naples and San Francisco by no means relieves the famine sufferers in Japan. They have suffered long and patiently and have yet to wait for the growing harvest which will not ripen till July. "Charity knows no nationality, no latitude, no longitude. It does not recognise distance. It knows but one duty in circumstances such as these." It is also written, "If thine enemy hunger, feed him; if he thirst give him drink." The Japanese are our friends, and have the greater claims upon us.

Never was a case in which small sums would go so far as in relieving this distress in Japan where people can live upon so little. A very little sacrifice such as almost any one might make would suffice to feed some famished person, or some starving family, for a day or a week. To give for this object is to cast bread upon the waters, and from the little sacrifice thus made will come the consciousness and satisfaction of duty done. The smallest as well as the largest contributions will be thankfully received, duly acknowledged and forwarded to the sufferers.

Senator Lougheed has been chosen as the Conservative leader in the Senate in place of Sir Mackenzie Bowell. The new leader was born in Ontario, in 1854, is a lawyer and a K. C. He practised law first in Toronto and since then in Calgary where he resides. He was called to the Senate in 1880.

The Study Class of the Historical Society after a very successful winter during which the study of Island history engaged much attention, had a good closing on Saturday afternoon. The papers read and the inspiring addresses delivered by prominent persons give evidence that the Class has obtained a sure foothold and has a career of interest and importance before it.

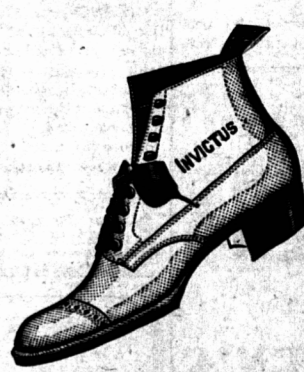
