Cook's Corner

PEPPERMINT CREAM

By chocolate curls, we mean the curd chocolate cut off very thinly. If you haven't a potato peeler that will do this for you, slice off short lengths of chocolate with a paring knife—they won't exactly curl, but they do curve nicely.

1 cup milk
1/2 cup heavy cream
3 tablespoons corn-starch
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 egg, separated
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Peppermint flavoring
1 tablespoon fine granulated sugar
Curls of semi-sweet or sweet chocolate.
Combine the milk and orange rind and bring to scalding point in double boiler. Remove orange rind. Combine corn-starch, 1/2 cup sugar and salt; gradually stir in part of the scalded milk; return to upper part of double boiler and cook over low, direct heat, stirring constantly, until smoothly thickened. Cover and cool, with occasional stirring, until no raw flavor of starch remains—about 8 minutes longer.

Beat egg-yolk lightly and gradually stir in part of the corn-starch mixture; return to double boiler and cook, stirring constantly, for 1 minute. Remove from heat.
Stir in vanilla and peppermint flavoring to your liking—about 1/2 teaspoon should be enough.
Cool to lukewarm.
Beat the egg-white until stiff but not dry and gradually beat in the 1/2 cup sugar. Add meringue to cooled pudding and fold in lightly.
Pour into individual dessert glasses and chill.
Just before serving sprinkle top of dessert with the chocolate curls. Pass pouring cream.

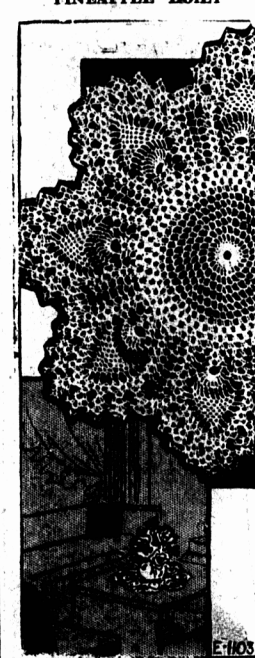

Cleaning Brass Brass can be cleaned and restored to its shine by use of a lemon. Peel and cut the fruit into two pieces. Rub the surface well over the brass article. Wash off lemon well and polish, first with a dry, then with a woolly cloth. Rub very hard to make it bright shine.

Broken Cork If a part of the broken cork has slipped down into the bottle, pour in enough household ammonia to float the cork, let it stand for a few days and it will break into fine pieces. It can then be removed without difficulty.
