CUT THIS OUT AND PASTE IT UP

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert news matter of an advertising nature. In most of these cases the senders, who are frequently not known to any member of the staff and who have no account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free. Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking that his advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department proper, and thus subscribers have no privileges of free advertising and are on the same footing as non-subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear in the Morning Daily or the Rural Daily, whether for one or more times in either Daily, or in both, whether as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified ad or otherwise. When for church or charitable purposes they seldom ever say so, or do not enclose sufficient money to pay for same all of which will be returned by first mail in the event of the item not being chargeable, or if more money is sent than necessary to pay for the item the surplus will be returned at once, there being a greater discount for cash with order for advertising of churches & than for regular business. In all such cases the Advertising department communicates with the sender as quickly as possible by mail or phone, often paying the messenger service to get them to the telephone if not too far distant, thus saving all possible time. People write this office to know if News, Letters to Editor, etc., are charged for, and to all such there is but one reply—all items etc., of a money making nature, even though they be somewhat of a news nature, are chargeable. For instance, the advance notice or notices of a concert, lecture, pie social, picnic, etc., are chargeable if an admission fee, silver collection, sale of pies or sale of food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious services, even tho' a silver collection is to be taken up, are not chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The

news of any past, present or future business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable, if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase it. Verses accompanying death notices are also chargeable. Even items which are actual news and not chargeable but once in either Morning Daily or Rural Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion, as they are thus not news. The above facts are given for the purpose of assisting persons who have items, etc., to mail to this office, so that delay and disappointment will be avoided. 3-16drt.

CUT THIS OUT AND PASTE IT UP It is surprising the large number of people in Charlottetown who, when they want to inquire about their Morning Daily or Rural Daily, or both, ask the Central for the News phone No. 133, or for the Advertising Phone No. 132.3, instead of 142; or when they want to inquire about advertising ask Central for the Subscription Phone No. 132-2, or for the News Phone No. 133, instead of 132-3; or when they want the News or Editorial department ask Central for the Subscription Phone No. 132-2, or the Advertising Phone No. 132-3, instead of 133, although all those departments and their respective phone numbers are plainly given in the telephone book. Some people, instead of looking at the book, even phone one of the above departments to find out what number to ask for to get another department. All this is a great waste of time on the part of the person phoning, the operator at the Central, and the clerk in the department wrongly phoned. The news staff, on an upper floor, cannot give the necessary information about either advertising or subscriptions, nor the advertising staff about subscriptions or news; nor the subscription staff about advertising or news. In other words the clerks know and can do but their own work in their own departments, and if it were otherwise they would be continually running from one department to another, upstairs and down, mixing work, wearing themselves out and causing the greatest possible confusion. On and after 7 p.m. daily it is useless to ask for any phone number except 133. Patrons who consult their phone books for the numbers they really want will greatly lessen the work of the patient Central telephone and Guardian clerks and thus help make their lives much brighter and happier. 3-16dft.
