It was alleged that the plaintiff was kicked in the porch of the Methodist Church at that place. The defendant admitted the kicking but claimed that he had first been struck on the face. 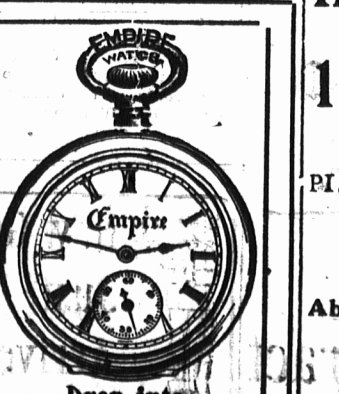
