Stresses meaning Of dedication To Empire cause

Following is the text of an inspiring sermon preached in St. Paul's Church on St. Peter's Day (Dedication Sunday), by the Rev. A. LeDrew Gardner:

The Acts of the Apostles, third chapter sixth verse: "Then Peter said, Silver and gold have I none, but such as I have I give thee, in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk."

Today, the 29th of June, is always observed our Church as St. Peter's day, and it is well that we stop to take a glance at his life, though there is so much told in Scripture about him that we could not expect to cover it, and all that we can do is to take one incident and meditate on it.

Today, also, we are asked by Royal Proclamation to re-dedicate ourselves to our nation; and this incident from the life of St. Peter seems to me to describe the common attitude that every man needs the solution of our need. Let me read you the whole passage:

"Now Peter and John went up together into the temple at the ninth hour. And a certain man lame from his mother's womb was carried, whom they carried daily to the temple which is called Beautiful, to ask alms of them that entered into the temple; who seeing Peter and John about to go into the temple asked them, 'Give me something.' And Peter said, 'Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have I give thee.' In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk. He took him by the right hand, and lifted him; and immediately his feet and ankle bones received strength. And he leaped up, and walked, and entered with them into the temple, walking, and leaping, and praising God. As Peter and John left Solomon's Porch to enter the temple building they saw before them the white marble steps leading up to the heavy bronze doors. So heavy that it took twenty men to open or shut them known as the Beautiful Gate. On these steps, as on the steps of most eastern temples, sat beggars requesting alms of worshippers.

There is sitting on these steps a man who is very well known; he has been in the city for many years, and he is blind, lame, and deaf. Peter and John are about to go into the temple he holds out his hands and asks for alms. He had been doing this for years, and his religious people have been very considerate of him, and had given him exactly what he had asked; and there he is today, sitting on the temple steps, asking for alms. But this morning he gets a surprise, these two men admit, 'We have no money, no silver or gold,' but such as I have I give I unto you.

"If you have not any silver or gold, what have you that is of any value to you? He took them and perceived what they could have; and then Peter, fastening his eyes upon him, said these wonderful words, 'In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk.' The man could not believe it, so Peter stretched out his hand, and with the help of Peter he was lifted up to his feet. And he was told he danced into the temple, praising God—he had his real need satisfied. Of all the people who ever went into the temple, he was the only one who ever saw the lame man's real need, and when he ministered to that real need, all the other needs of his were solved. That is of particular application today.

Times of Crisis

That lame man, lame from his birth, is a picture to me of my country and my empire, that, through no fault of its own, perhaps has fallen upon very unhappy times. It was no fault of this man that he was lame; he had been so from birth, and we are still in our unhappy times that have fallen on us are not of our own seeking, and they have been with us for a long time—from birth.

It is not new—this is not the first time in its history that our country and our empire have turned to God and asked for help. It will go back to the very dawn of our history you will find time and time again we have turned to the people and asked for help. The requests are granted, and arrows, ramparts, forts, ships, and then we come to guns, rifles, aeroplanes, tanks; and the request was always granted, and always will be granted. The proof that it has always been granted is the fact that we are still preserved, that the Empire today is continuing its old custom of asking for help, and the help for which she asks is just as real, just as vital, just as necessary to her as the alms for the lame man. And the request is granted, and that need has always been met; but, like the need of the lame man, it ever continues, tomorrow he is there, and the year after he is still there, and still asking for help; and so it has been with us. From the very first time we were asked for alms it was granted, but within a few years she came back again, and so it has gone on all down through the centuries, a need has arisen, a request granted, but the need always remains, and ever recurs.

And so today once again our Empire is standing making request for us. "For special dedication to national service and sacrifice" to invoke the blessing of Almighty God. "For the preservation of our civilization" "for the bringing about of a lasting and righteous peace." Those are the same requests that have been made for us for centuries after century, and for centuries after century those requests have been granted, but the need ever recurs.

This request will be asked again in the future of your children unless something happens to our Empire, just as this man came who asked as happened to that lame man. He expected to go on for the rest of his life asking alms of people, but a man came who told him, 'Silver and gold have I none, yet I can satisfy your need; though I have not a cent I can satisfy your need to such an extent that you will never have to ask again.' In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk. And the lame man arose, and walked, and never again did he sit upon those steps to ask for aid.

Essential Requirements

My country today, as it were, sits upon the steps of the Church of God, and she is asking for aid. And I can do, and you can do, as your fathers and forefathers have done—you can give to your country just what she asks—you can satisfy her need for the minute, but rest assured that if you do that and stop there that your boys and girls will have to do the same thing again; the need will continue. But you can also do another thing—you can believe in Jesus Christ—you have gifts to give that no one else has; you can give to your country such a gift that she will never have to come back and ask again; we can make such an offering today to God and to our country that the future will be observed for our boys and our girls, and we may have the assurance that they will never have to grant this request for guns, ammunition and tanks.

What have we got to give? You have the power of the name of Jesus Christ—"In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk." And if we today accept of a god who believe in Jesus Christ would let loose in our midst the power of Jesus, then we would find that it meets our every need, and other things that we ask for are superficial, and you can grant all these now but the need will ever recur. It will always be there, though it is always met; but if you will give to your country an unexpected gift, if you will give to your country a heart and mind and soul dedicated to God, filled with the love of God, filled with the power of Jesus, then you will let loose to your country a power that will fulfil its deepest need, and every need will be met both for the present and the future. Yes, there is a day coming when they shall receive something that is new, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they be at war, for the power of God is coming when mankind is to be under the power and the authority and the guidance of Jesus Christ.

Why should it rest with me, if you and it rests with me, it is going to be a mass movement that is going to sweep our country and our Empire into the Kingdom of God—it is going to be the individual soul dedicating himself to God. You may stand alone, as Peter and John did on the temple steps, but you will be the power of God, and you may be able to speak that word of power, "In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk."

And if the Church of God today in Canada, in our Empire, would speak that word in its meaning, and in all its assurance, we need have no fear of the future for our country or our Empire, or for the world which we live in. We do bid you today to dedicate yourselves to the Empire, but I ask you to dedicate yourselves to God, to be filled with that power of God, that power that is the name of Jesus Christ, I know if you will do that then you will have a spirit of love to dedicate to your country that is beyond any human description.

"Silver and gold have I none, but such as I have"—don't despise what you have, for it is the name of Jesus that alone can meet the needs of the day in which we live, and that alone will meet the needs of this day and in the days to come. Do you know the verse which Bishop Pilcher has composed as a Latin verse for O Canada? Let me repeat it for you, as he told "O Canada, our land, our pride, our love, High be thine aim, All selfish aims above; Thy maple leaves, blood red, recall Christ's cross of splendid pain; Thy golden sheaves, made bread of life, whose death was gain; 'Tis he who dwells in thy heart, O Canada, our land, our pride, our love, Thy Christ who calls thee." "Such as I have, O Canada, give I thee—in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk."

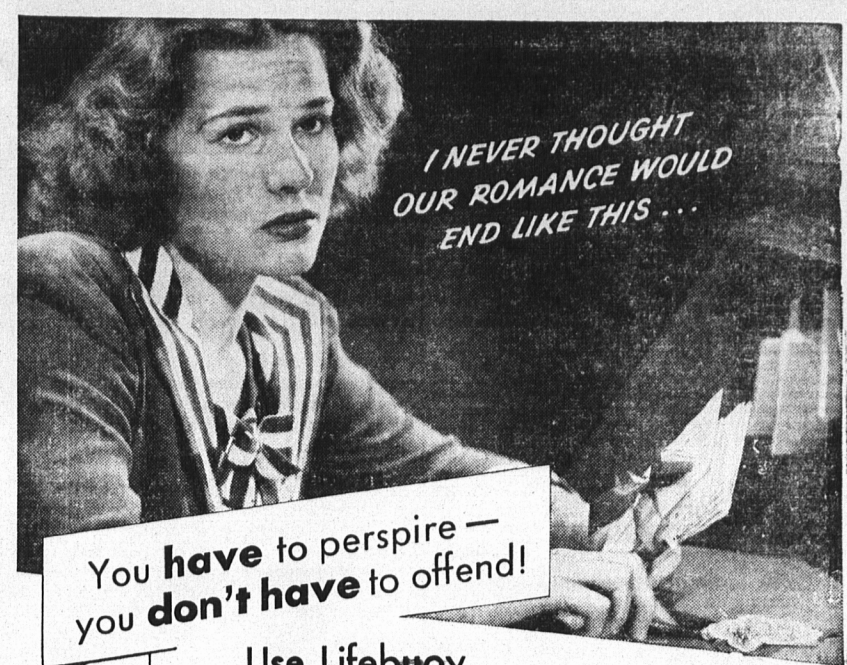
