Will Be Tried Separately On Murder Charge
(MONTREAL, Que., April 9)-It was decided today that William Wilkinson, 21, and Jack Edgett, 20, both charged with the murder of Marcel Dupre, 22 year old restaurant keeper, during a holdup, will be tried separately for the crime.

They appeared today for preliminary hearing on the capital charge, both having already pleaded guilty to other hold-up charges, for which they received jail sentences totalling 14 years each and 20 strokes of the lash.

That Wilkinson, under the name of Williams, has been granted leniency because of his youth when he was convicted of an auto theft charge last winter was found out today, Judge Enright let him off with a promise to mend his ways, and to report to the court a month later.

MONTREAL, April 9.-Following an inquest into the death of Marcel Dupre, youthful Montreal restaurateur, who was shot on March 28 and died on Monday morning, at which they were held criminally responsible for the death by a jury under acting-Coroner Pierre Herbert, M. D., William Wilkinson, 21 years of age, of 1136 Chenneville Street, and his companion, Jack Edgett, 20 years of age, of 1256 St. George Street were charged with murder.

The inquest, which was held early in the day, revealed some very surprising and interesting phases concerning the murder of Marcel Dupre. The dead man's ante-mortem statement as well as Edgett's confession to the police, were read to the jury by Sergeant Detective Polier. The former shows that Dupre on his deathbed identified his slayer, while the confession reveals the name and identity of the man said to have shot Dupre.

"I shot the guy. He struck me in the face and I had to do something in order to protect myself and I shot." Wilkinson is supposed to have said to Edgett after the crime, according to the confession. "He shot me," said Dupre on his deathbed, pointing to Wilkinson, who was lined among ten other men in the hospital.

Sergeant Detective Polier, who with Bourdon, Gursky and Laroche arrested Wilkinson and Edgett, read the confession made and signed by Edgett on the day of the arrest. In the confession Edgett stated that he had taken an automobile from a north-end garage and committed the first hold-up on a gasoline station at the corner of Rachel and Berville streets.

After leaving the scene he drove to a restaurant on Craig Street where he picked up Wilkinson. They decided to hold up a restaurant on Amherst street near Ontario street. They went into the restaurant under the name of "Chez Marcel" and they asked him for sandwiches, Wilkinson followed him, while Edgett went to the cash register. Suddenly Edgett heard a shot and Wilkinson running out said, "Hurry Jack." They then left the premises and drove to a restaurant on St. Catherine street west, where they had a meal. Edgett then states in the confession, that when Wilkinson went home, he drove the car on Bleury St. and parked it opposite a theatre while he went into a blind pig. It was when he went back to the automobile that he was arrested by detectives. In conclusion, the confession states, "I was drunk at the time of the shooting and the other hold-up and did not know what I was doing." This confession Edgett has signed.
