FORTY FOXES IN RANCH.—Attention is directed to the advertisement of the Atlantic Black Foxes Ltd., which appears in this issue. The number of foxes in this ranch is forty and not ten as appeared a few days ago.

FINE NEW BRIDGE.—This spring contractor Hughes and McQueen completed a splendid wooden bridge across the Earncliffe Creek, thus joining the western end of the two Earncliffe roads. This bridge fills a long-felt want in this locality and the Government is to be commended for its construction. But before this bridge can be fully available to the public a new piece of road has to be built there, and this has been promised. Mr. Annes McManus the cheese maker is in charge again this year. His assistant is Mr. Fyter Carragher. The victims of a series of accidents in Cornwall, vicinity during the past month are improving and their friends are pleased to see them about again, amongst these might be mentioned Mrs. Wm. Howard who was confined to her house from a fractured ankle bone. Mr. H. W. Mallett, who sustained injuries by being thrown out of a truck wagon, and W. C. Howard of Clyde River who fractured his shoulder blade by being thrown from his horse.—W

SECURING PATENT.—Mr. Harry McTavish, inventor and patentee of folding boxes and crates, is now obtaining Canadian patents on his device. Working models of this box will be manufactured and on the market about August 15th, 1914, manufactured under United States Patent No. 769429, already secured and owned entirely by Mr. McTavish, who now controls the exclusive American rights. Some few years ago a folding box was invented by Mr. Henry C. Schafer of Dayton, Ohio, and those boxes were manufactured in large quantities and supplied the States. The McTavish Patent however has many points of advantage over this one of previous years. Applications is also filed for British patents and blue prints were mailed to parties interested in Liverpool, England, but as far as can be learned they are lost amongst the large mail that went down on the ill fated ship, Empress of Ireland. Other blue prints can be obtained on applying to Washington, D. C.

Last year Milkmaid qualified for the Record of Performance although in her 15th year. Her daughter, Milkmaid 7th, hold the Canadian Record and the daughter of Milkmaid 7th, has completed a test which will place her in the forefront of the Canadian Ayrshires. The official record has not yet been received by MacRae & Sons. This daughter has also dropped a very promising calf, so that MacRae & Sons are building up a family which is making their name known all over the world.

P. E. ISLANDERS IN IT.—Golden Windermere Limited is the name of a company recently incorporated in Ottawa with a capital of \$2,000,000, divided into shares of \$100. Among the directors are four prominent Prince Edward Islanders, Senators P. C. Murphy and B. C. Prowse, Mr. A. A. McLean, M.P., and Hon. Charles Dalton. The company has acquired 43,000 acres of the land in British Columbia, at the foot of the Rockies, which it is claimed has vast agricultural possibilities. Part of the land becomes flooded during June, July and August, by the melting of the glaciers in the Rocky Mountains. This, it is said, has a wonderful fertilizing effect on the land and the proposition looks particularly rich. Associated with the gentlemen above named are many other prominent Canadians, among them Hon. Wm. Pugsley, Mr. G. W. Fowler, Capt. R. T. M. Scott, Clarence Jameson and others.

THE DINNIS RANCH

The Dennis Ranch on the Mt. Edward Road has an enviable history of success. Last year 7 per cent. of the Island's increase of young foxes were born in this Ranch. This year Mr. Dennis has so far seen 58 young foxes. It is not much wonder that he is called the "Wizard Rancher." This is the best report The Guardian has received from any ranch so far. As Mr. Dennis is invariably successful in bringing all viable puppies to maturity, having never lost a young fox from worms, it may safely be assumed that the ranch will again hold a premier position in the Province in regard to the number of foxes. Mr. Dennis claims to have a specific for the worm pest. He says that Dr. Higgins hit the nail squarely on the head when he pointed out the danger of dosing all young foxes for worms. As there is a high mortality among young foxes Mr. Dennis' remedy is a valuable breeding secret, and the Fox Breeders Association would do well to take steps to require it. 2356.

A VISIT TO MARSHFIELD

The feature in Prince Edward Island scenery which most impresses a stranger, is the unbroken succession of well tilled farms along practically every road, giving the whole landscape the appearance of a well kept garden. At this season of the year this feature is particularly striking. Green fields, alternate continuously with newly sown or newly prepared fields; hedgerows or rows of tall, stately trees border the fields, while well kept groves stand here and there like beds of flowers in a mammoth garden. A representative of The Guardian had the pleasure the other day of a drive along St. Peter's Road to Marshfield, some six miles east of Charlottetown, and one of the oldest and richest sections of the province. Perhaps nowhere else on the Island is the gardenlike feature more striking than along this road, and perhaps nowhere else is the matter-of-fact, substantial and prosperous farm more in evidence. At Marshfield, fronting on East River and commanding a most picturesque view of the river and the garden farms beyond, are homesteads which may well be called model farms. Of those noted in passing are the farms of Mr. Heber Crosby, the "Old Brad" Crock farm, which specializes in Short-horn Cattle and Clydesdale horses; the old Senator Haythorne farm now owned by Mr. Peter M'N Robertson; the old Senator Ferguson farm now owned by Mr. Henry Boswell; the old "William Miller farm; now owned by Mr. John F. McFarlane; the farm of Mr. Edgar Heartz who makes a specialty of Holstein and Clydesdales the farms of Messrs Duncan Darrach, John A. Ferguson and Charles H. Robertson. The farms just mentioned adjoin each other and, taken altogether, represent probably more farm value than could be found in an equal area anywhere else in the province. A call at the farm of Mr. John A. Ferguson gave the writer an idea of the scale upon which farming operations are being carried on at least on one of these farms. To begin with the farm itself is ideally situated, fronting the East River towards which it slopes gently, giving its nicely laid out fields the full benefit of sun and warmth. An orchard of some 100 apple trees and a rambar of cherry trees, the latter having the unique distinction of being now under bloom for their fourth consecutive full crop, provides abundance of fruit for home and market. The special feature of the farm, however, is its herd of Ayrshire cattle, a breed which Mr. Ferguson has specialized in and won distinction for himself as a breeder. There are 35 head of cattle in the herd, most of them pure bred and the remainder grades. The head of the herd, "Fairview Reformer," is a purebred Ayrshire, a magnificent animal bred by Messrs MacRae and Sons, the well known Ayrshire breeders. His dam was a noted milker, giving on her last yearly test 13,700 pounds of milk. Eighteen cows of this herd are being milked. Of these seven are purebred, the others being grades and almost equal to purebreds, having been carefully bred from the best milking strains. Every cow in the

herd is numbered and a daily record of her milk is kept, so that the performance of each animal can be ascertained at any time. In addition to those mentioned, five pure bred calves are being raised, all of them very promising animals and bred from the best cows in the herd. Mr. Ferguson's method of feeding is in keeping with the quality of his splendid herd. A system of water-works furnishes a constant supply of pure water for the cattle; ensilage is provided as supplementary feed, 12 acres of corn being the average yearly supply and Mr. Ferguson has been very successful in his corn raising. In addition to this he grows an average of 8 to 10 acres of green feed—oats and peas or vetches—for summer feed. Mr. Ferguson does not confine his attention to cattle alone although these are his specialty. He has eight horses, among them a splendid purebred Clydesdale mare imported from Scotland, the others all good stock. Besides these he raises hogs on a considerable scale. This year he has 18 handsome Yorkshire hogs, many of them prizewinners; a flock of 150 purebred barred Plymouth Rock hens which produce eggs by the case and which are specially marketed as "Ferguson eggs" and constantly in demand. These are but a few of the things noted on this most interesting farm during a brief but pleasant visit. The commodious outbuildings and their many modern conveniences might also be mentioned did space permit. It is a typical farm in a typically agricultural section of the province, only one of many of which the province is justly proud and which have won for the Island its pet name "The Garden of the Gulf."
