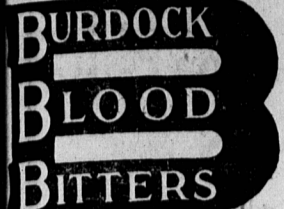

Admiral Field To Take Post

(Special to The Guardian)
LONDON, June 5.—Within the next few days Admiral Sir Roger Keyes, Commander-in-Chief of the Mediterranean fleet for the last three years, will relinquish that post and be succeeded by Admiral Sir Frederick Field, according to a message broadcast by the official British station today.

Admiral Field is expected to hoist his flag on the Queen Elizabeth at the end of the week. Only a few weeks ago Admiral Keyes' second in command, Admiral Collard, was relieved after a dispute with two of his officers which led to their court-martial.

Admiral Field first saw service during the Boxer trouble in China in 1900. At the Battle of Jutland he commanded the battleship King George V. He has been deputy chief of the naval staff and was one of the British delegates at the Geneva Conference last year.

FIRST ROYAL COURT A BRILLIANT SCENE

Description Of First Of Season's Courts Held By The King And Queen.

LONDON, June 2.—Describing the first Royal Court of the season, which took place at Buckingham Palace on the night of May 8, a London paper says the Throne Room, where the Court was held, was ablaze with light and beautiful color. Hydrangeas, lilies, and Dorothy Perkins roses formed the floral setting against which glittered the uniforms, orders, and decorations of foreign diplomats and the soft tints of the women's dresses.

Members of the Corps Diplomatique are always bidden to the first Court, and, in addition, there were a great number of representatives of the Dominions. As early as five o'clock cars began to line the Mall, but it was nearly 9 o'clock before their exquisitely gowned and jewelled occupants alighted on the red carpet in the Palace Yard and entered the huge hall.

After the discarding of cloaks there was the walk up the impressive grand staircase to the first drawing room. Here seated on rows of gilt chairs, the gay company waited breathlessly. TRUSTEES BROADEN SCOPE OF HAIG MEMORIAL HOMES

Original Scheme Found Not Sufficient To Meet Needs Of Ex-Service Men.

LONDON, June 2.—The original appeal for a memorial to Lord Haig stated that the money raised would be devoted to the erection of homes, adequately endowed, in various parts of the country for the benefit of Ex-Service men of all ranks, their widows and orphans.

"Experience obtained since our appointment," the trustees state "indicate that applications from Ex-service men's families for housing accommodation will prove more numerous and more varied than was at first anticipated.

"We have decided, therefore, in order to make the money go further, to give equally satisfactory results to bricks and mortar, to reserve to ourselves the right to earmark a proportion of all future monies subscribed for the provision of a fund, the interests of which will be utilized to assist Ex-Service men and their dependents with housing and accommodation other than in the Haig Memorial Homes.

The Greenfield Meeting

Greenfield, Mass. June 6.—The fifteenth renewal of the Bay State Circuit will start here on Thursday. All of the stables and almost all of the cattle buildings are full of horses.

Of the stables which made long trips the Niles outfit from Kansas City, Mo. has the travel record. Frank Fox also arrived with four horses from his farm near Indianapolis while Ben Keith dropped in from the same point with a few. As usual, Orange County, New York, has sent a lot of racing material. Charley Mabrey was the first trainer to check in. He brought four head, one being the useful mare Widow Grattan. He was followed by Fred Hyde, Ed Kirby, Edmond Butler, and W. Leese. All of the leading training camps in New England have also sent their usual quota.

Last year the colts races proved the most attractive features at the meeting and the youngsters are apt to repeat in 1928. In the two year event Bingen McKillo which was wintered in Ben White's stable at Orlando, Fla. Will meet the local trained youngster Great Canto which made a yearling record of 2:28 3/4 at Lexington last fall. Kirby, who brought out Plucky at the Greenfield meeting last year, is also in with the two promising colts Corn Husker and Corn Dodger, both of which have shown their ability to trot in 2:20.

W. H. Dickinson, the President of the Bay State Circuit, had his home bred colt, Chow Mein in this event. As he showed lameness after working a mile in 2:23, it was decided to hold him over until next season. Harry Brusie has sunny Mac and Expressive Lou to pick from while Roger Rourke can decide whether he will start Can't Guy or Stack Nelson.

The three year old trot will bring out the western filly Shirley Harvey, which won thirteen out of fourteen starts last year, as well as the Bay State Circuit regulars Miss Eclipse and Plucky, which were seen at all of the meetings in the two year old races last year. The newcomers include Grace Dickinson by the Senator, Miss Neva by Orphan Axworthy, and Mistress Meddlesome from Kolanka Farm with Will Caton in the sulky.

There are fourteen nominations in the three year old pace. They are a well bred lot, such sires as Abbedale, Peter McKillo, Arion Guy,
