AMONG THE RINKS.

CANADIANS WON.
WINNIPEG, Man. Feb. 8.—The feature of today's play at the bonspiel was the curling contest for the International trophy between Canada and the United States rinks at the bonspiel. The result was a victory for Canada by one point, the total standing 66 to 65, six rinks a side.

BREEN WINS FROM DALTON.
The second of a series of three races between Hudson Breen and Ned Dalton was skated at the Victoria Rink, St. John, Thursday, before about 1,900 spectators. Breen won by about three feet, after a hard struggle from start to finish. Time 3.05.

HOCKEY.
The Shamrocks won at Montreal on the 8th inst. by a score of 4-3, and the Montrealers are now practically out of race for the championship. The Shamrocks lead with a score of 4-1; Vics come next with 3-1; then Ottawa with 2-2; Montreal with 2-3, and Quebec with 4 losses. There are still nine games in the series to play, and there is only one way in which Montreal still has a chance after that night's lesson.

In the hockey games at the Queen rink St. John on Friday night the Amherst club defeated the Neptunes, 6 to 2. The Mohawks beat the St. John B. and A's by 1 to 0. The game was a very fast one.

The Crescents defeated the Mutuals in a hockey match at Halifax on the 10th inst by a score of 11 to 1. If the Chebnets should beat the Wanderers in the next game, then the Crescents and Wanderers would be tie for the championship.

ATTY. GEN. MARTIN

Proposes Another Startling Measure.

Hugh Ryan, Well-Known Irish Contractor Dead — He Built Great Works — Bradstreets on Canadian Trade — Ontario Government Grants Charter for Iron Works.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 13. (Special)—Attorney General Martin has introduced a bill to disfranchise all judges, sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, employees of the provincial government, marines, officers and soldiers of the imperial service.

This will disqualify hundreds of Conservative and Martin voters.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—Bradstreet's weekly report has the following:—Unusually cold weather is not confined to the United States, but its effects on trade are reported in Canada. Toronto reports a good spring trade doing, lumber improving, export inquiry better and the outlook for a very busy season.

In general trade expansion is predicted. Business is only fair at Victoria. In the maritime provinces trade is dull, lumbering is retarded by lack of snow and collections are poor.

Montreal reports closer scrutiny of small retail credits, growing out of effects of competition of large department stores. General trade is fairly good, but scarcity of snow checks country trade.

Business failures number 38, compared with 51 in this week last year. Bank clearings in the Dominion aggregate \$27,700,000, a decrease of 4.5 per cent, from last week and a fraction of 1 per cent, from this week a year ago.

TORONTO, Feb. 13.—[Special]—Hugh Ryan, the well known contractor and ex-alderman died this morning.

He was born in Limerick in 1832 and came to Canada in 1841. In 1850 he entered upon contracting in the construction of railways and canals. Among many important works afterwards constructed by him were twenty miles of the Intercolonial, including the Miramichi bridges, and over 230 miles of the C. P. R. He was also contractor for the Sault Ste Marie canal, which occupied six years.

In 1895 he fitted up a wing of St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, for the use of patients of all denominations, at a cost of \$40,000. In religion he was Roman Catholic; in politics an active Liberal.

The government has granted a charter to a concern that will operate the iron and steel works at B-lleville.

ECONOMY NECESSARY

In School Board Administration—The Council Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held yesterday evening.

Coun. Nicholson was the only absentee. The meeting was a very short one but the business transacted was equal to that of the average meeting. No unnecessary time was lost in discussion. All was business.

After routine a communication was read from the School Board, giving the estimates for the current year at \$10,090.

Coun. Crabbe believed that according to the increased demands for money by the School Board it was about time to cry a halt. With the sewer debt now upon us and the economy necessarily practiced in civic administration it should be apparent to the School Board that a like economy is needed in that department. He believed a committee should wait upon the Board to consider this matter.

On motion of Coun. Horne, seconded by Coun. Hooper, the Finance Committee were appointed to wait on the School Board to see if they cannot reduce their estimate.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the School Board asking for \$1,000 on account.

Coun. Crabbe moved, seconded by Coun. Taylor: Resolved, that the assessors are hereby instructed and required to send in and make similar returns as heretofore required of them, of the values of all real estate in the City omitted by them in their previous return, or which have changed ownership or occupancy in the meantime.

Also the value of all personal property so omitted as aforesaid or which has since their last return come into the city, or which has changed ownership in the meantime.

Also of all persons liable to pay poll tax, who have been so omitted as aforesaid or who have been liable to be assessed since the last return of said Assessors, such return to include that required under the Charlottetown Water Works Act 1887. Carried.

Coun. Crabbe moved, seconded by Coun. Taylor, that the School Board be requested to join the City Council in a memorial to the legislature to pass an act vesting the title of Prince Street school in the City Council. Carried.

EASTERN NOTES.

Cold weather, and much sickness in nearly all parts of the country have characterized the last weeks. The dreaded grippie is doing its work, and whole families are suffering from its many symptoms. On the 7th inst. Capt. Jas. McDonald of East Point passed over to the great majority at the age of sixty-six years. Genial, whole souled and good hearted, a general favorite with all, he leaves a blank in the community not easily filled. He followed the sea for many years, a capable and successful master-mariner, but left it some time ago to live on his farm. Two sons have gone before him, one butied in the Atlantic, the grave-yard of so many of his neighbors.

—On the 8th inst., Mrs. Scott, wife of the well-known Deacon Scott, passed away at the venerable age of eighty-one years, leaving a disconsolate husband, after fifty-five years of happy married life. A faithful wife, a devoted mother, an agreeable neighbor has gone to her reward. Hospitable in her home, charitable in her actions, generous to the poor, and a friend to the needy, foremost in every good work, quiet and unostentatious in her manner, she leaves a vacancy in the family circle in which she was the honored and worthy mother, in the community in which she was a respected member, and in the church in which she was a shining example. One daughter, the late Mrs. Elijah McVane, preceded her to the spirit land about a year and a half ago.—On the 9th another old landmark identified with the country for many years in the person of Keyron Holland of East Baltic, passed to his eternal reward. Born in Ireland seventy-nine years ago, and coming to the Island at the age of sixteen to be for himself a home out of the unbroken forest, he endured all the privations of the pioneers of this country. Intelligent to a remarkable degree, a keen observer of men and things, endowed with all the wit and with many of the virtues of his race, he died at a ripe old age, respected and regretted by all. He was in the chapel in Ireland when Governor Howlan was christened.

DISESTABLISH'ENT

Of the English Church Near at Hand.

Great Snow Storm Blocks Railway Traffic in Eastern States — Steamships Overdue — Coal Famine Threatened — Affairs of Cuba, and Philippines — New Magazine.

LONDON, Feb. 13.—[Special]—Dis-establishment of the Church of England seems to be in the air and is now regarded as the only practical remedy for the church difficulty.

HAVANA, Feb. 13.—[Special]—The Bishop has issued a warning to Catholics not to trust the education of their children to other than Catholics. Marquelles will represent Spain here.

Great indignation is expressed over the arrangements of Garcia's funeral, that Major Miranda was his only officer that assisted in the function. The other pall-bearers were chiefly negroes.

PARIS, February 13.—Lady Randolph Churchill (formerly Miss Jerome, of New York.) is about to start a magazine on new lines. It will be sumptuously bound and sold at a guinea (\$5) per copy. Her son, Hon. Winston Churchill, will assist her in conducting it, and the list of contributing will include Emperor William and other royal personages.

MANILA Feb. 13.—[Special]—Everything is quiet here. There was some firing along the lines on Sunday night but no casualties.

BOSTON Feb. 13.—[Special]—There was a heavy, blinding snow storm on Sunday and to-day through New England and New York, with big drifts. Trains are delayed. Atlantic liners are over due at New York and a general tie-up of traffic.

The Nova Scotia barkentine Brazil, ashore at Moriches, Long Island is breaking up.

Delaware river is filled with ice. Not a barge has passed out for days and a coal famine is threatened at those parts that depend on Pennsylvania for anthracite.

The Reading Railroad has been compelled to abandon its entire service because of drifts.

Street Lighting in Liverpool.

Liverpool is said to be one of the best lighted cities in the world. About forty miles of streets are now lighted by the aner burner, the rest by ordinary burners and only five miles by arc lights. A recent English exchange says, "Street lighting in Liverpool received some attention at the last meeting of the City Council. It is expected that in the next two or three years every part of the city will be lighted by the aner gas burner. The total cost will be between £20,000 and £25,000, but it is not expected that there will be any increase in the rate is on this account. With regard to electricity the chairman of the lighting committee said it would be impossible to light the streets properly by that means owing to the enormous increase in the rates that would result." A remarkable thing in this connection is that the city owns the electric plant and the gas works are run by a private company.
