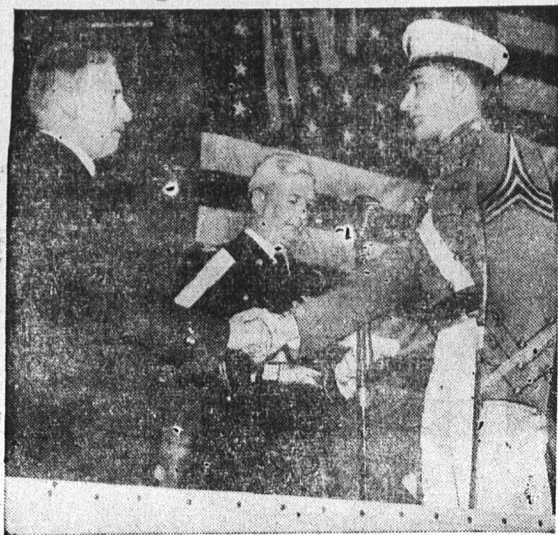


"Upon Your Shoulders"

(Continued from page 1) standing. But how he'll move, and when, is anybody's guess." The possibility that Hitler might be rebuffed in any demands on Russia was suggested in reports received by diplomatic quarters at Helsinki, Finland, Saturday night to the effect that Joseph Stalin is meeting strong army opposition in his "German appeasement policy." These advices contended Stalin himself favors additional concessions to Germany while the defence commissar, S. K. Timoshenko, opposes any such move. London's Sunday newspapers devoted extensive comment to the German-Russian position.

The Sunday Times' diplomatic correspondent poses the question whether Hitler plans a swift knockout blow against Russia or whether he merely is running an elaborate bluff to get quickly and easily the oil and grain he needs.

The correspondent argued that Hitler might try a swift assault with a three-fold design: 1. Destroy the Russian military and air menace; 2. Obtain oil and grain supplies for a long war and, 3. Then turn the full fury of the German military machine upon Britain before United States aid reaches its maximum volume.

Reports from Ankara, Turkey, claimed well-informed quarters there are in agreement that important developments in the Soviet-German nerve war are due now at any time.

Diplomats in the Turkish capital were repeating a remark attributed to Goering that "Germany needs the Ukraine for a long war against the Anglo-Saxons."

All roads leading from Rumania to her former province, Rumania-occupied Bessarabia, were reported Saturday to have been closed and mined.

Travelers arriving in Turkey from Bucharest, the Rumanian capital, said Rumanian army officers were openly boasting that they soon would regain possession of the territory former King Carol surrendered after a Russian ultimatum last June.

Everything Ready for Big celebration

Arrangements were practically completed on Saturday for the Torch Day Celebration which will be held tomorrow afternoon. Seat-shape and program committees have made excellent plans to cope with the large crowd expected and parking arrangements have also been looked after. No cars will be allowed to be parked along the route of march, after 4 p.m. and patrols will be on duty to see that this regulation is enforced. After the parade passes in the main vein at the Exhibition Ground it will "break" about opposite to the Grand Stand ticket office. The Military route through the gate to the track accompanied by the five bands will be the fraternal societies, Boy Scouts, Girl Guides and other units will march to the entrance between the east bleacher and the main Grand Stand.

Ushers who had previously seated invited ladies' societies, will then take charge and show the different units to the parts of the Grand Stand allotted to them. Persons not forming part of the parade will be admitted to the grounds as always and to the Grand Stand and Bleachers (through the Grand Stand Entrance. This system is to prevent any confusion and none should stay away because of the belief that there will not be room—that idea is erroneous as there is seating accommodation for over 7,000 people, and 1500 more can be accommodated in front of Grand Stand and Bleachers.

It must also be borne in mind that while the parade will total some 3500 or more, nearly 2000 of these will be in the military forces and bands which will be on the track. Several hundred others, performers and invited guests, will be seated on the vaudeville stage.

The Godfrey sound system is being installed today and it will enable the program to reach every section of the audience clearly. People are asked to be in their seats before 7 p.m. as the program will start right on the dot. The parade is timed to reach the grounds at about 6.45 p.m. and the remaining 15 minutes would provide ample time for everybody to be comfortably seated.

On the front page will be found the program and for the convenience of those who are not familiar with the units taking part in the parade, also the route of march. It is repeated here.

Details of the route of march were submitted by the military and approved. They had been most carefully planned and the arrangements were considered excellent. His Worship was asked to endeavor to have places of business closed at 4 p.m. so that those taking part in the parade would have an opportunity to get prepared and be in position.

Points at 5.30 p.m. for parade No. 1, the assembly point of which is Rochoford Square, and the units of which includes: The P.E.I. Light Horse Band led by R. C. M.P., Canadian Legion, R.C.N.V.R., Detachment of R.C.G.S., Sgt. D. W. O. T.C., North Nova Scotia Highlanders led by their band, No. 62 C.A. B.T.C., No. 31 G.R. School R. A. F., Fraternal Societies led by the League of the Cross Band, Charlottetown Fire Department, Red Cross, on foot, Charlottetown Male Chorus on float.

Parade No. 2 will be at its assembly point near King Square, at 5.45 p.m. and will be made up of the following units: Band of West Kent School, West Kent School Cadet Corps, Queen's School Cadet Corps, Boy Scouts, Summer School Girl's Band, Girl Guides, West Kent School children, Queen Street School children, Prince Street School children, Rochford Street school children, Notre Dame Convent children.

The route of march will be as follows: Parade No. 1 will march from Rochoford Square at 5.45 p.m. (Daylight Saving Time) with an interval of 20 paces between units, and go up Kent Street to Queen, and go up Prince to Kent where it will be joined as it passes King Square, by parade No. 2. At the head of the column marches down Kent Street and comes opposite the Kent Street entrance to Prince of Wales College, the Commanding Officer will give the "Eyes Right" and Major General C.B. The allies have declared their purpose is to take the capitals and the rest of the mandate from Vichy within the least possible bloodshed.

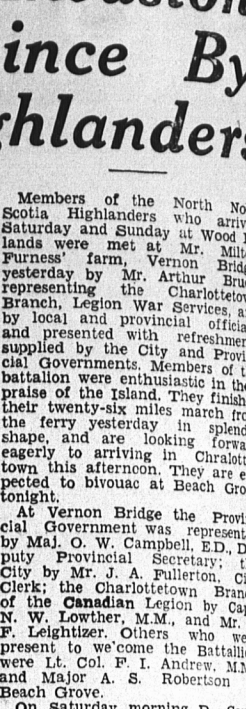
