MARKET REVIEW

Bank debts to individual accounts which are regarded as a fairly sensitive business thermometer support the indication that there was some seasonal improvement in May but that comparison continued unfavorable with the corresponding period of 1929. At \$3,426 millions, the debts for the Dominion were the highest for any month since December, but were down 18 percent from the total for May, 1929. Bank debts for the first 5 months of 1930 are lower than the corresponding period not only in 1929 but also of 1928, but are higher than 1927 and other years back to 1924, when the records were started by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

Oil Companies

One business that is running ahead this year in all parts of Canada is that of the oil group, in the production and sale of gasoline and lubrication oil. While there is a tendency to curtail expenditures at the present time, this does not appear to have had much influence on the

demand from the service stations, and good increase in sales are reported. Another factor of growing importance is motor boating. Probably never before this form of amusement has been so popular in Canada as it is today. The producers of "outboard" motors are doing a record business and as a result thousands of these engines are in use today with a substantial demand for gas and oil. To meet the growing demand for motorboats the gas companies are installing filling stations around the different lakes. Another growing form of gas consumption comes from the aviators, whose employment is spreading rapidly for pleasure as well as business. The securities of the oil group promise to give a good account of themselves this year.

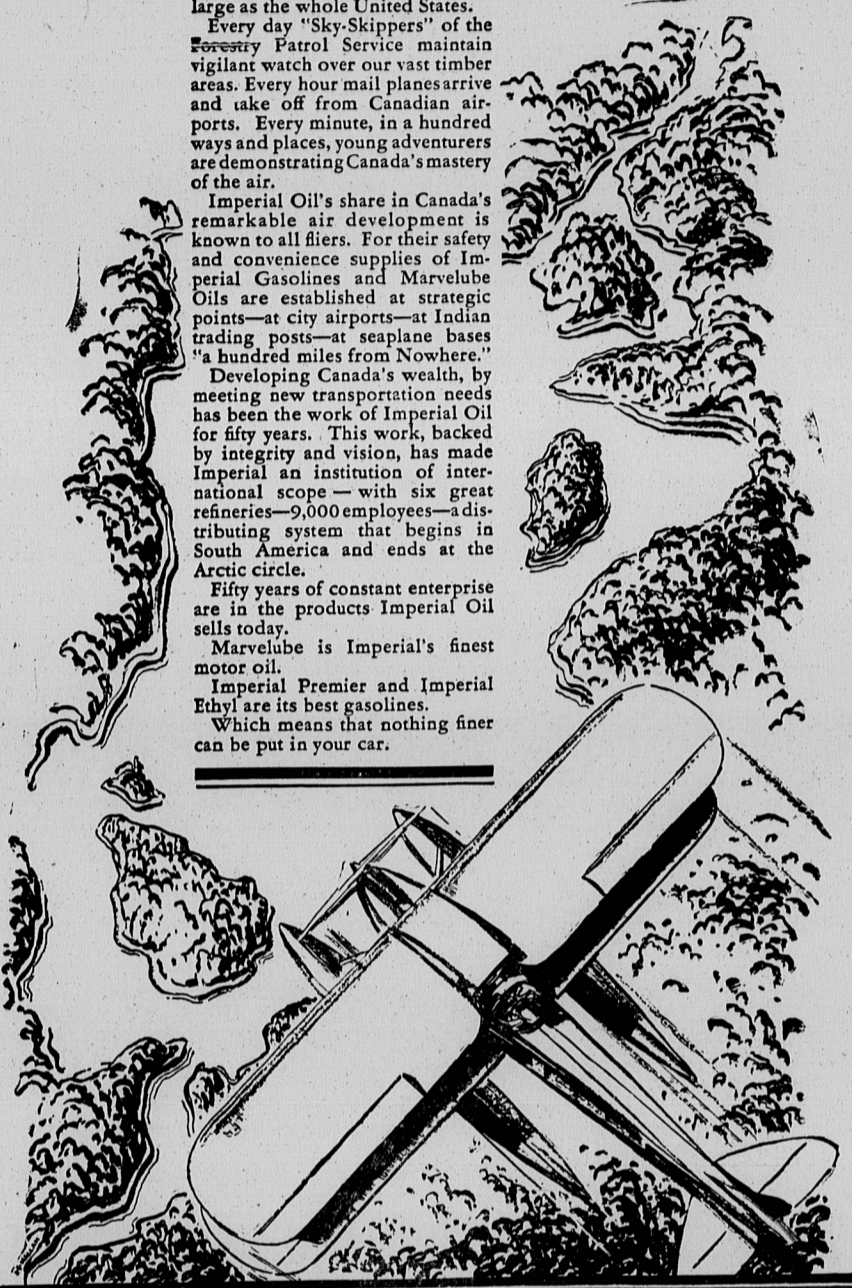
