"PLEASURE CRUISE" To Aid Crippled Children

Belfast

A large congregation attended the morning service at St. John's Presbyterian Church, Belfast on Oct. 14th, among the number being friends from Charlottetown, who motored out to attend the service which was of special interest as the unveiling of the Memorial window took place. The pastor, Rev. Wallace Woodland took as his text Isaiah 60-3, "Who are these that fly as a cloud, and as the doves to their windows". In his splendid address he mentioned the windows of the mind, the soul, of heaven and finally the windows of our church which he explained in part as follows: "The memorial window is in four panels each with the figure of a Saint in very beautiful colors. The first panel from left to right has the figure of St. Nicholas standing with an open book in hand. He is the patron saint of Russia and is said also of Skye but this may bear investigation. Nevertheless it is very appropriate as so many of the pioneers of our church were from Skye. In the lower right of this panel is shown the figures of three little girls and underneath three bags of gold both enclosed in a shield. The former refers to the saint's great love for children and the latter the wealth of the sea which is very appropriate, as we are a Maritime people. The second panel has the figures of Saint Andrew with cross in hand same as one of the crosses on our Union Jack. The third panel has the figure of St. John with scroll in hand and his calm expression brings to the writers mind "the disciple that Jesus loved". This panel is of special interest on account of the name of our church. The last panel contains the striking figure of St. Paul, the great missionary with sword in hand and his reference to same in his writings in the New Testament come at once to the mind when looking at this particular part of the window. As our church has always been a missionary one this panel is also very appropriate.

The window was unveiled by Messrs Thos. W. Morrison and David L. Morrison, cousins of the

deceased ladies, who made this beautiful addition to the church possible and it is known as "The Williams' Memorial window." The unveiling took place during the singing of Hymn No. 109 "Unto the hills around do I lift up." The choir moving slowly down to the body of the church to witness same, and returning to their places during the singing of the closing Hymn "Rock of Ages" which ended a memorable service, for everybody that was privileged to be present.
