The coldest temperature recorded yesterday was thirty five degrees above zero and the highest was forty above. At nine p. m. the mercury stood at thirty seven degrees above. The coldest recorded the previous night was thirty eight above.

The followers of long distance racing in the maritime provinces are waiting with interest the big race which takes place at Amherst on Saturday afternoon. The race is open to the maritime provinces and the entries include Fred S. Cameron, the long distance amateur champion of the maritime provinces, and Robert Fowler, the amateur champion of America. Fowler has met and defeated many of the long-distance men in Cape Breton, Newfoundland, and parts of Nova Scotia. Fowler is looked upon as the fastest amateur in the United States and was winner in the Boston Marathon recently and on a previous occasion ran second to Tom Longboat in the big annual event at Boston, in the year that Longboat broke the record. Fowler was also one of the American team to go to the Olympic games in Greece. Bob Fowler left Sydney Tuesday night for Amherst. He is in the pink of condition, and while his forte is the marathon distance, he says Cameron will have to break the tape inside of fifty seven to win.

Rev W. E. Hinson was tendered a royal welcome by the Christian Brotherhood at an At Home given in the vestry last night in his honor. There was a large gathering in attendance, and it was clearly apparent, as evidenced on all sides, that the former beloved pastor of that church, is still held in the highest esteem and respect. 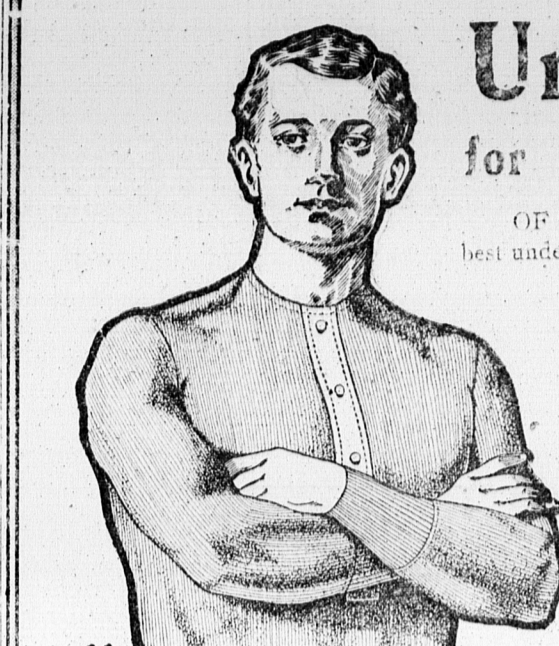
