uela while the remainder comes from the Mexican Gulf.

It was also stated that the consumption of oil in the Maritimes is higher than it was one year ago. That the supply of oil is plentiful was verified by one of the officials when he stated that the U.S.A. was making cut backs in her production.

The oil development in Alberta will bring about a reduction in the price of gasoline in all three of the Prairie provinces. A pipe line of 150 miles length is being laid from the Alberta fields to Lake Superior which will give these provinces a tremendous oil supply.

Following the conference the officials visited His Honor Lieutenant Governor J. A. Bernard at Government House. Their visit to the Province was conducted by Mr. J. Cerry, Island manager of Imperial Oil.

Company directors accompanying Mr. Stewart were Messrs. J. F. White, and F. G. Hall, both vice-presidents and directors; F. C. Mechin, C. E. Carson and M. L. Haider, directors. All are from Toronto.

Mr. Orin MacGregor, District Manager at Halifax and Mr. W. W. Shaford, Manager of the Maritime Marketing Division, Halifax, are accompanying the officials on the tour.

They will leave this morning by air for Gander. Later they will visit St. John's and centres in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick before returning to Montreal.

The warning came from Dr. Harold C. Urey, Nobel prize-winning atomic physicist, along with an admonition that defences against such a threat should be erected "soon."
