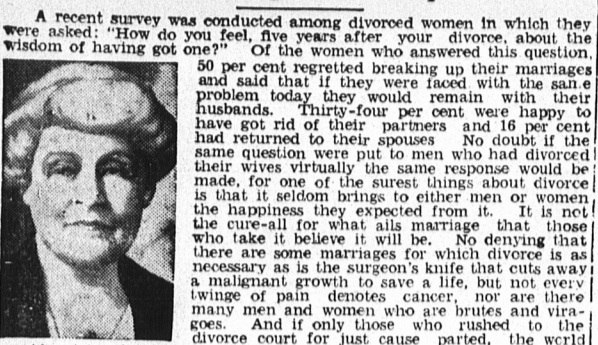

DIVORCE SELDOM BRINGS FREEDOM THAT IS EXPECTED

Greater Percentage Of Men And Women Who Have Severed Marital Relations Later Regret The Step



A recent survey was conducted among divorced women in which they were asked: "How do you feel, five years after your divorce, about the wisdom of having got one?" Of the women who answered this question, 50 per cent regretted breaking up their marriages. No doubt if they were faced with the same problem today they would remain with their husbands. Thirty-four per cent were happy to have got rid of their partners and 16 per cent had returned to their spouses. No doubt if the same question were put to men who had divorced their wives virtually the same response would be made, for one of the surest things about divorce is that it seldom brings to either men or women the happiness they expected from it. It is not the cure-all for what ails marriage that those who take it believe it will be. No denying that there are some marriages for which divorce is as necessary as is the surgeon's knife that cuts away a malignant growth to save a life, but not every twinge of pain denotes cancer, nor are there many men and women who are brutes and viragoes. And if only those who rushed to the divorce court for just cause parted, the world would not be cluttered up with broken homes as it is now. With the right or wrong of divorce we are not concerned now. We are only discussing the fact that nothing else brings such disappointment with it. The man who is fed up with domesticity; who is tired of hearing children cry; who is weary of looking at the same woman every day across the breakfast table and listening to her senseless chatter; who resents having to spend his money on supporting a family instead of his own pleasure and who rebels at having to furnish an alibi for every minute of the time he is away from home, thinks he would be perfectly happy if he could only get rid of the wife who has come to represent nothing but his slavery to him.

But when he gets his freedom he finds that it is dust and ashes in his teeth. Somehow marriage has unfitted him for bachelorhood. He misses a home and home comforts. There is no kick in staying out nights when nobody knows or cares whether he ever comes back or not. cook over boiling water, stirring continuously, until the mixture thickens. Add the vanilla and cool before placing in the cornflake crumb crust. Cover with the following meringue.

CRISP CHOCOLATE SQUARES

Method: Combine white sugar, 3-4 cup corn syrup, 3 tablespoons cocoa, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, 8 cups rice krispies. Mix thoroughly. Press into a greased pan. Chill well, and then cut in squares to serve.

MERINGUE

3 egg whites
6 tablespoons sugar
Method: Beat the egg whites until stiff, but not dry, and then fold in the sugar. Place in the cream filling and sprinkle the reserved 1-4 cup of cornflake crumb mixture over the top. Bake in a moderately slow oven (325 deg. F.) for about 12 to 15 minutes, or until the meringue is delicately browned. Cool to serve.

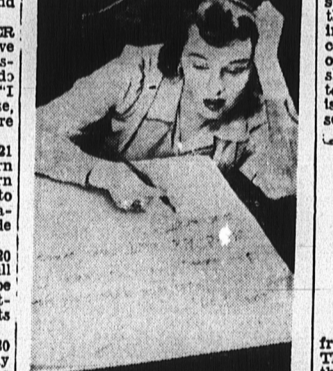
