REDMEN OF CANADA OFFER MONEY AND MEN TO "HELP GREAT FATHER THE KING" DEFEAT THE GERMANS

OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—Much as Canada has done since the war began to show her loyalty to the cause of liberty, and much as have other nations within the British Empire done, there is nothing more noteworthy than the response of the Red Indian of Canada. The remnants of the once great races that roamed these broad acres have grown few in these years, but those that remain have presented the nations of the world with a lesson of loyalty to the British Empire, and the reasons why such loyalty has been born.

Poverty stricken as most of them are nearly every tribe of Indians in Canada has subscribed something for the Canadian Patriotic Fund, while every chief has offered help in the fighting line and many of them in fact everyone who is of fighting age has demanded as his rights that he should be allowed to take his place in the front of battle.
The two head chiefs of the famous Blood Indians "Shot Both Sides" and "Ermine Horses," worthy descendants of a knightly race, send one thousand dollars "to be used in whatever way may be deemed of most advantage to British arms in this time of peril. Our desire to contribute is not on account of the money we can give, but as a token of the pride we have in our country, our King and our government."

VETERANS OF WAR OF 1812.

Chief Oboosaway of the Sucker Creek Indians, in sending \$500 remarks proudly that "their forefathers fought faithfully under the British flag in 1812 and in 1870 four members of the Sucker's Creek band went on the war expedition with Sir Garnet Wolseley to the Red River."
Chief Pahpewash of the Sheguianians also sends \$500 of their funds and the resolution giving this amount was moved by Ggakizheonga and seconded by Wandahbeens. These men are anxious to be called upon to serve.

The Metlakatla Indians of Northern British Columbia have volunteered the services of all the braves in their band to serve with the regiment now being recruited at Prince Rupert. The Metlakatlas are a well known organization of magnificent men.

OFFER OF CORPS OF GUIDES.

The Tsimshan tribes of British Columbia have offered to form a corps of guides and the local military authorities are strongly in favor of this movement as they know that among the Indians of these tribes is the very best of material for such a corps.
The world famous Sioux Indians have already a dozen of their braves with the 19th Alberta Dragons in the first contingent. They are the pride of the regiment, noble specimens of manhood. All the Algonquins want to be recruited into the regiment and become a time-worn saying in Canada, and the money end of the offers of help may appeal more to the credulity of the people. Amongst the very poorest are the Chippewas of Beauceid, who live on the Christian Islands, Chief Monague and Joseph.

Copesog authorize \$100 to be taken for the British flag to which they belong."

Kincoshameg, chief of the Manitoulin Island Indians, sends \$2,000 from himself and his fighting men to help "our great father the King," but they want also to go to the front.

The Chippewas of Sarnia subscribe \$1,000 "to show their loyalty to the crown and to assist Canada in aiding the mother country."

The Six Nations of Grand River, famous in Canadian history, sends \$1,500 to the Duke of Connaught to be forwarded to the Imperial authorities as a token of the alliance existing between the Six Nations Indians and the British crown.

They also offer their warriors for active service in defence of the empire. It hardly requires to be added there are no finer warriors in the whole British Empire.

The Rama Indians send \$50 "to wards the sustenance of the families of those who have gone to the front." The Cape Mudge, B.C., Indians subscribe \$100 and ask to be allowed to "do their part in the defence of our country."

The Blackfoot Indians want to fight "for the liberty and honor of the Empire," and they send \$1,200 to be used in helping to bring this war "to a successful conclusion for our country and our Empire."

Chiefs Iron Shields and Yellow Horse assure the government that their support and help will be given at all times.

Chief Big Belly and Councillor Big Wolf of the Sarces send \$500 expressing sympathy with the King, Canada and the Empire and assure the government of support and help at all times.

Peganabow and two other warriors of the Peigan band have already gone to the front with the first Canadian contingent. They are in the 23rd regiment. More of these warriors want to be sent. They subscribe \$100.

Chief Sampson of the Shesheganwings vote \$500 as they are "very anxious to assist in whatever way we can in helping our country in her time of need."

Chief Black Plume of the Peigans sends a particularly ardent letter of loyalty along with \$1,600. The Peigan warriors are "in great anxiety" to be in the fighting line.

The Chippewas of the Thames send \$200 and the Cape Croker Indians \$500.

The North Temiskaming Indians contribute \$1,000 and while doing so have in mind the distressed Belgians, for they want "to assist in alleviating some of the misery caused by the European conflict especially through the Belgian country."

In all these descendants of the former owners of this great Dominion have already subscribed \$12,350. Several regiments of warriors of unexcelled prowess can be recruited if it is considered necessary.
In this connection there is an excellent story told here of the grandson of General Brant who when he heard that Colonel Currie, M. P., was going to the front wrote him, "hoping he would come back with a hundred German scalps in his belt."

Piche, and the men were each presented with smoking supplies from the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. Subsequently the Vets, marched out, making a very fine appearance. It is expected that the two corps will later on proceed direct to join the first Canadian contingent in England and accompany them to the continent.

Over a thousand French Canadian recruits are now in barracks at St. Johns with the 22nd "Le Regiment Royal Canadien," under Col. Gaucet. This includes 135 men and four officers from Quebec. It is expected that the battalion will soon have its full equipment, as four companies out of the eight have already received their uniforms and the rest of the supplies are expected within a few days.
