JACK JOHNSON WAS FINED \$1000.

CHICAGO, April 23—Jack Johnson, negro pugilist, was fined \$1000 by Judge Carpenter in the United States District Court today, after charges of smuggling a \$2000 necklace had been dropped, and the heavy weight had pleaded nolle contendere to charges of concealing from Federal officials the fact that he had jewelry in his possession. The necklace was forfeited to the Government, and probably will be sold at auction. The action winds up the lesser of two cases which Federal authorities have against Johnson. He is still to come to trial on an indictment charging violation of the Mann Act. The necklace was brought into this country when the pugilist's first white wife, who afterwards committed suicide, returned from a European tour.

STRATHCONA INSTITUTE.—At the last general meeting of the Strathcona Institute held at Hazelbrook on April 22nd the following resolution was passed unanimously: "That the prohibiting of the running of automobiles is the best possible act for P. E. I., be it therefore resolved; that we the Officers and members of Strathcona Farmers Institute enter our protest against passing an act to allow them to run on our country roads, at least until such time as proper roads would be constructed whereon to operate them." FLORAL SOCIETY.—A meeting of the Floral Association of Prince Edward Island was held last night in the office of Mr. Williams, with the President, Mr. J. A. Clark, in the chair. After reading and confirming the minutes of the previous meeting, a constitution and code of bye-laws was adopted. The prize list was then taken up and a few changes and additions made. It was decided to postpone publication of these pending receipt of further suggestions. Mr. W. S. Lounsbury donated a silver medal to be given as first prize for the best collection of wild flowers to be exhibited at the Flower Show in August, open to all the children of the province. It was decided that competition at the Flower Show would be confined to members of the Association with the exception of that in wild flowers which will be open to all children, also that no entry fee would be charged exhibitors. A fee of ten cents will be charged for general admission to the Show. A committee was appointed to wait upon the Commissioner of Agriculture with a view to securing financial assistance from the government. The selection of a building in which to hold the Flower Show was left in the hands of the Executive Committee. The meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the President.
