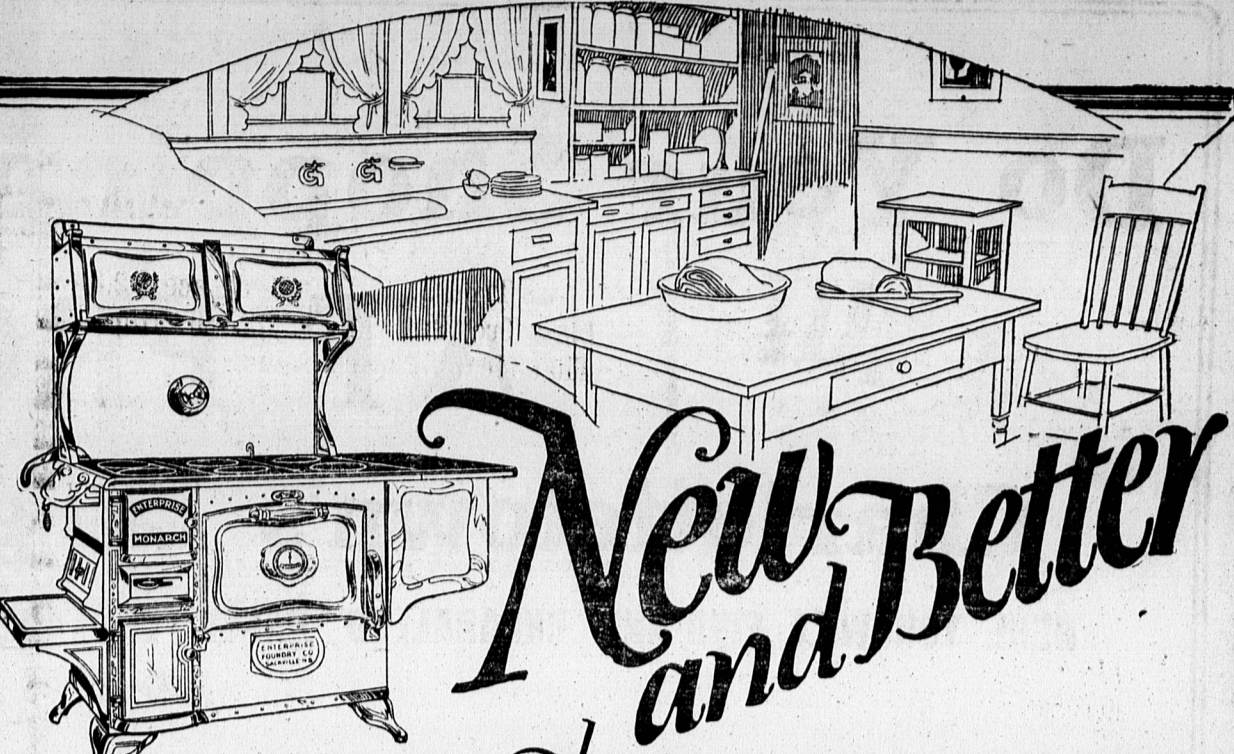

METHODS OF APPLYING BARNYARD MANURE. Taking an average for an eleven-year period the data indicate that for potatoes manure spread during the winter or in the spring over a fall ploughing of timothy sod gives the highest yields. Manure spread on timothy sod and ploughed under in the autumn also proved very satisfactory. As a yield of grain is expected, the highest yield of grain was obtained when the crop received ten tons of manure as a top dressing in the spring. The yield, however, was not materially higher than where all the manure was applied for roots and the practice perhaps could not be recommended for rich land as they rain crop would be inclined to lodge. With the hay crops the highest yields were obtained following top dressing on the grain or when part of the manure was applied as a top dressing on the hay crop in the spring. Figured from a cash basis at prevailing market prices, the highest return has been from plots receiving all of the manure in the autumn in preparation for the potato crop of the following season. B.
