COLD WEEK END—Prince Edward Islanders had the coldest day this winter on Saturday. It was learned last night from Mr. Warren Burns, weather observer at the Charlottetown Experimental Station. Highest thermometer reading during the day was eight above. It was learned it was down to three above during the night. The cold was backed by a wind from the north and north west which ranged in velocity from 20 to 25 miles-per-hour during the week end. Actual thermometer readings were lower earlier in the winter than on Saturday. It was pointed out, but the cold spell was accompanied by unusually calm weather and during the day the thermometer went much higher than Saturday's level. The weather was described as "treacherous" for the cold was accompanied by a falling barometer usually an indication of rising temperatures.
