A marriage attended with unusual interest was solemnized at five o'clock Wednesday, October 15th at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Crozier, Baltic, P. E. Island, when the Rev. Alfred George Clark of Apohaqui, N. B., second son of W. H. and Rachel Clark of Sandhurst, Kent, Eng., was united in holy wedlock to Margaret Elizabeth Casely daughter of the late Henry James and Esther Elizabeth Carr Casely of Kensington, P. E. I. The Rev. G. T. Spriggs, B. A., tied the nuptial knot; other clergymen present were the Rev. E. M. Aitken, of Malpeque, P. E. I., and the Rev. Theodore Ross of Sussex, N. B.

The bridal party entered the parlor, which was beautifully decorated in color scheme of silver and white with a canopy of bells with banks of floral beauty to the strains of Lohengrin's Wedding March played by Mrs. Chester Simpson, Malpeque. Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Crozier were the attendants.

The bride was charmingly gowned in ivory radiance silk lace with veil and orange blossoms. She carried a bouquet of pink blush roses and maiden hair fern.

While the bride and groom were signing the register Miss Flora Campbell, Charlottetown, cousin of the bride, sang with powerful effect the song "Because". The bride and groom were showered with congratulations and confetti. The groom's gift to the bride was a pendant gold cross set with pearls and to the attendants and to the organist chimes. A lavish display of presents, beautiful and costly, were evidences of the esteem in which the recipients are held.

About sixty guests sat down to a sumptuous supper, served in fine style; the blending of exquisite cut flowers showed artistic skill. The supper ended, short speeches of good will were made by the clergymen present to the bride and groom, who made fitting response. During the evening the guests were entertained by solos, duets and a wonderful singing song led by the Rev. Mr. Ross and the Rev. Mr. Aitken. Mrs. H. C. Simpson, acting as accompanist.

The happy couple left by motor on Friday morning en route to New Brunswick where at Apohaqui they have a new home overlooking the Kennebecasis River. The bride's travelling dress was of navy blue velvet, harmonizing with blue coat and hat. Mr. and Mrs. Clark will be at home to receive their friends after November 12.

The bride is well known and has many friends in the Western part of this province, she has also formed many friendships in Sussex, N. B., where she spent several winters the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Hope. The groom is a teacher of life long experience divided between Britain, Western and Eastern Canada in churches, colleges, schools and homes he started out at the early age of eight as choir boy, at the age of seventeen as teacher in the home day school and as organist in the church. At nineteen he became an active part of the Church Army and was connected with it for six years at the end of which he responded to a call from Western Canada where there was great lack of trained teachers and Church Clergymen.

As a trained school and music teacher he received license from Archbishop Matheson, D. D. of Winnipeg, Manitoba—now retiring Anglican Primate of all Canada—to organize and conduct church work in newly settled territories and directed the financial business of building five new churches during twelve years.

In 1908 he became a student of St. John's College, Winnipeg and Manitoba University, after which he received full orders at the hands of Archbishop Matheson in St. John's Cathedral, Winnipeg.

At the outbreak of the war, he went overseas and signed on for regular duties of a war chaplain as well as service under the British War Office.

At the end of four years, his doctors ordered a quiet life in a quiet place. Mr. Clark returned to Canada in 1920, settling with the Rev. G. F.

Had Hectic Career  
In Newburyport

Mr. Andrew J. Gillis, Mayor of Newburyport, Mass., who is visiting his parents' home at Grand River, was born in Newburyport but is the son of the late Andrew Gillis of Grand River. His mother came from Ireland. He has won a name for himself in Newburyport as a "go-getter," and to eventually achieve what landed him in a Mayor's office. His object was to have a filling station in the residential district of the town. At that time the mayor and council would not grant Mr. Gillis the permit, so he ran an election and beat the Mayor who opposed him. The majority of the council were still against him, but he finally won their support. During his office he was put into the Salem Jail and from jail he organized the campaign which was to elect the council to promote his object and his own election as Mayor for the second term. After the city gave him permission he had to fight the state authorities. He successfully surmounted this difficulty and became the owner of a large filling station which he has since disposed of to the Standard Oil Co., but he still retains and operates an old filling station in another section of the city. The Mayor started as a poor boy. He has made himself famous as "The Mayor who went to jail."

One of his properties is the old Newburyport jail which he purchased so that he could be confined in his stones of the old council.—S.

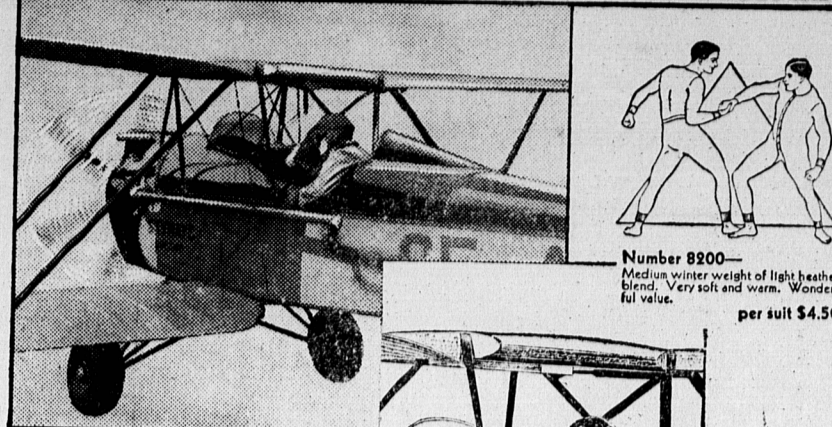

When running his campaign for mayor he erected a cemetery on his filling station containing tombstones of the old council.—S.

FIRST AID

The very real value of first aid in the case of fracture—such first aid as Scouts can render—is convincingly illustrated in two cases described by Dr. J. H. R. Rond of Winnipeg.

Not far from Winnipeg, on the same and within a short distance of one another two men met with a simple fracture of the leg. They received treatment at the same hospital one man had received first aid treatment from a St. John ambulance certificate holder. He reached the Hospital in good condition, and was discharged in between three and four weeks, cured and suffering no further effects from his injury.
