WARNING AGAINST RECKLESS DRIVING SOUNDED BY JURY

"White Gloves" Presented Chief Justice Mathieson At Opening Of Supreme Court At S'side Yesterday — Court Adjourned Sine Die.

Warning against reckless driving on streets and highways was sounded in the report of the Grand Jury submitted yesterday at the June term of the Supreme Court in Summeride.

Chief Justice the Hon. J. A. Mathieson presided at session, which was adjourned sine die. As there were no criminal cases on the docket the Sheriff, Mr. F. J. E. Wright presented His Lordship with the customary white gloves.

Lawyers present were Hon. Thane A. Campbell, K.C., Health Strong, K.C., L. G. Lewis, W. Henry Noonan, C. D. MacCallum, Watson MacNaught.

On the docket was an appeal case of the King vs. Margaret Perry, an appeal from a conviction of Wilfred Tanton and Edward Thompson, J.P. Alberton; also a civil non jury case of Howard B. Wood vs. W. B. MacNeil.

On motion of C. D. MacCallum acting for the appellant in the appeal case, the appeal was allowed and the conviction quashed with out costs. On motion of the respondent consenting.

On motion of W. Henry Noonan acting for plaintiff in the civil non jury case, this case was laid over until a date fixed. On motion of the defendant Mr. C. D. MacCallum represented the defendants in this case.

In the case of the King vs. Joseph Gallant, left over from last term on charges of theft. On motion of Health Strong, K.C., Counsel for the prisoner a judgment of Nolle Prosequi was entered and the prisoner discharged and his bail bond cancelled. At the same time a date fixed for the appearance of the material witness was absent and said to be in the United States.

On motion of the second floor is located the R.C.M.P. office, County Court Room, County Court Judge's Private Room, Judges' Chamber, Barristers' Room, Baristers' Library, Jury Room, Department of Justice Room and Supreme Court Room. These floors are all covered with hardwood flooring. All these rooms are accessible to the public.

Third Floor—This floor is fitted for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police with four bedrooms, kitchenette and bathroom with all fixtures including shower bath. The remaining part of this third floor is the residence of the jailer and includes living room, kitchen, two bedrooms, bathroom and hall. The bathroom, kitchen and living room are covered with tile, the kitchen with Battleship Linoleum and the room floors and hall with hardwood flooring.

Fourth Floor—This floor has been completely covered with tile, tongue and groove spruce flooring and will be used for storing surplus material from the different offices.

New desks and tables have been provided for the different offices and the Supreme Court Room has been completely changed, with new desks and chairs for the judges, new tables and chairs for the clerks, the ceiling of this room is very artistically arranged as you will see, and great credit is due the architect, who planned this room as well as the entire building.

It is difficult with the short time at our disposal to give a detailed account of this building and its value and interest to the citizens of this County. We believe that all these rooms that we have mentioned are fitted with the latest furniture.

A building has been secured and has been moved to the land adjoining the Court House. This, with some remodeling, is to be used for storing the cars of the Mounted Police.

We believe that this Court House building now is one of the finest buildings in the Province as well as the whole of Canada. We are pleased to submit the report. Since the last report was made on this Court House Building, extensive operations and repairs have been made. We have gone over the property very carefully and find that the lawn on the outside has been properly levelled and graded and that the side walls of the building have been excavated to a distance of six feet and a new foundation wall built for the columns on a level of an equally high standard.

New windows have been placed in this building and the entire walls of the building have been refaced with brick, giving a very nice appearance. The whole front of the building has been re-modelled and new concrete steps have been erected.

On the North side quite a large extension has been added to the building making two nice store rooms and an entry to the main building has been made here in order that prisoners coming to and going from the jail would not be obliged to enter by the front entrance.

The roof has been shingled with slate shingles and all copper flashing used in order to make a substantial and tight job. The basement has been all fitted with eleven proper sanitary cells and a well equipped kitchen, where the prisoners will be permitted to do their cooking, washing, etc. Basin, toilet, and shower bath have been installed making the basement clean and sanitary.

The first floor has been all thorough and everything in connection of the different officials. The Recording Office has been enlarged and is now a lovely bright office and everything in connection with same is new, clean and sanitary. Adjoining this office is a new, large, roomy vault has been installed, all shined, and we believe now that the vault is as clean and sanitary. Adjoining this office are the Sheriff's Office, the Probationary Office and Jailor's Office have all been re-modelled and everything in connection with same is new and clean. They are fitted with desks, shelves and tables. A vault has been placed between the Sheriff's office and the Probationary office which can be used by both.

At the rear of these offices two exceptionally large day cells are fitted up, with toilet and basin for the use of prisoners only. One room is also in this part of the building for the use of any females. This is fitted with toilet, basin and shower bath. These three rooms have tile floors.

The corridors on this first floor are covered with tile flooring and the offices with battleship Linoleum.

Hitler Hails Legions Home From Spain

(By The Canadian Press)

Germany and Italy, who fought for the victorious Nationalists in Spain's civil war received triumphant welcomes in their respective homelands Tuesday.

Hitler welcomed the 18,000 Germans in an address from a tribunal in Berlin's Lustgarten in which he spoke freely for the first time of Germany's part in the Spanish conflict.

The Fuehrer told General Franco in July 1936, the month the revolt broke out, "was facing a conspiracy which was fed from all parts of the world," and that "I decided immediately to fulfill an appeal for help which this man addressed to me."

Hitler referred to the democracies—Britain and France—as "robbers" of colonies and drew a retort from Alfred Duff Cooper, former British First Lord of the Admiralty, that the answer should be 100,000 British enlistments in 24 hours.

The last of returning Italians, a group of 20,000, were welcomed at Naples by King Victor Emmanuel and Government and military officials.

France further centralized her defence machinery, naming 66-year-old General Maurice Gamelin as "commander-in-chief" of the nation's defence forces, with army, navy and air forces unified under him.

The Cuban Government a second time refused to grant a haven to 907 refugee German Jews as they cruised about on the German liner St. Louis somewhere between the coast of Florida and Cuba.

Barn Burned To Ground During Storm

During the height of a heavy electrical storm which raged over the western part of the Province on Monday afternoon the barn and granary belonging to Mr. James Murray of Elmsdale was struck and burned to the ground, around 5 P. M.

The barn is situated on the Dock Road near Alberton. The storm in this section of the province was particularly heavy. Summeride was visited by a mightier electrical storm about one hour earlier.

U. S. VISIT WILL BE MEMORABLE AND HISTORIC

British Sovereigns Are Assured Of Triumphant Four Day Visit.

(The following story was written for The Canadian Press by the staff correspondent of the Associated Press assigned to the Royal Tour in Canada and the United States.)

TORONTO, June 6.—(CP)—Within a few hours now King George and Queen Elizabeth will leave their Kingdom of Canada and after crossing the international boundary at Niagara Falls will be welcomed to the United States by Secretary of State Cordell Hull, who will accompany them to Washington.

That the visit will be historic and memorable is obvious. That it will result in the great intimacy between the two nations, the United States is by all judgments one can exercise at this time, equally obvious.

The other night one of the ladies-in-waiting of the royal entourage visited the pilot train which carries British and American correspondents and the royal special and during her conversations she expressed great interest and something akin to apprehension regarding the intensity of interest in the visit of the King and Queen, who have been throughout the whole trip to the Pacific and back again, what in the world will happen in Washington and New York where the people are supposed to be more demonstrative than here in the north.

In view of the apparent United States interest in the tour, as evidenced both by reports of the amount of space the visit has received in the press and by the size and energy of the American contingent of newspapermen and women covering the tour here in Canada, this expression of concern may be well justified.

American crowds may be found to be almost as enthusiastic as those the King and Queen have seen during their 6,000-mile progress through Canada, but there will be a difference in the character of the reception. Friendly curiosity, if it is granted that there is such a thing as friendly curiosity, will impel many to seek a glimpse of the monarchs who have captivated Canadian hearts.

Greater Formality

The King and Queen will not be able to mingle with American crowds as they have done in Canada; indeed it would be highly improper for them to do so because the bonds of such camaraderie do not exist. There will be no intimate scenes such as that at the National War Memorial in Ottawa, the ceremony of presenting crowns at Edmonton, or the family character of the meetings with the throngs of children at Brandon, or with the excited crowds at Melville in their other night.

Nevertheless, it will be surprising if Queen Elizabeth does not display that phase of the genius of her people, the ability to understand that have done so much to make the royal visit to Canada the greatest success it has been.

Genius is the word and its definition is an old one—the capacity for taking infinite pains. One imagines both the King and Queen could have travelled across the continent and back again with considerable less exertion, with less discomfort, less concern about meeting and talking with the general run of the subjects of their realm. They may not have intended more regal impressions behind them, but they chose to be friendly, human, understanding, and these are the qualities Canadians have reason to be proud of.

The King and Queen have appeared to enjoy every minute of it.

History In Making

Americans will admire their capacity for making their mission to Canada a success. To many Americans the historic significance of the occasion will be realized.

Not since the tragic episode of the puppet Emperor, who was executed by a Mexican firing squad 72 years ago, leaving his pitiful Empress Carlotta a madwoman for 60 years, has a monarch set foot on North American soil to claim allegiance of a people.

At the time the Hapsburg adventurer was executed in Mexico, Canadian Fathers of Confederation were just beginning to create the political unity of the provinces which today form the

Canadian nation.
It is a far cry from the Mexican throne dangled before the puppet Maximilian by Napoleon III to George VI of England and his charming Scottish commoner Queen who came invited by the elected government of the day to symbolize the unity of British peoples.

Seventy Kingdom of the United States, with the war between the States over, stood ready to rush an army across the Rio Grande under the veteran Sherman to destroy Maximilian and his tottering throne not collapsed of its own weakness.

Today British Sovereigns are to cross into the United States as guests of the United States Government.

I. R. A. Leader Held At Detroit

DETROIT, June 6.—Sean Russell, a leader of the outlawed Irish Republican Army, sat in an immigration detention camp and could hear the booming of guns and cheering as King George and Queen Elizabeth were welcomed to Windsor, Ont., across the Detroit River.

Russell insisted his arrival here on the eve of the royal visit to Windsor was "just coincidence."

Russell, who described himself as "head man" of the Republican Army which British authorities have blamed for terrorist bombings in London, is a federal prisoner pending deportation proceedings. He was arrested yesterday as he left a train from Chicago. Federal authorities said the British Foreign Office and Scotland Yard had asked that he be kept under surveillance during his stay in the United States.

"I had intended to go from Chicago direct to New York and then embark for England," Russell said. "I wish I had never come here. I did not have the faintest idea the King and Queen were going to be anywhere near Detroit."

Gamelin Is Given Supreme Command Of French Forces

PARIS, June 6.—(AP)—General Maurice Gamelin today became supreme commander of France's defence forces.

By Cabinet decree the 66-year-old soldier added the title of "Commander-in-Chief" to his already imposing list, concentrating in him more military power than ever before granted in the modern French Republic except to his sole superior, Premier Daladier. Land, sea and air forces are unified under General Gamelin's command.

General Gamelin now is in London for military talks with British, Polish and Turkish officers. An unassuming soldier, he is termed by his assistants as the lone soldier in France who "knows the value of our armies, their needs, their depths and their possibilities."

Threatened Life Of Premier Hepburn

TORONTO, June 6.—(CP)—Norman Primeau, 28, of Chatham, Ont., was remanded until June 13 for a medical examination when he appeared today in court on a charge of threatening to kill Premier Hepburn.

The charge reads that Primeau asked "unlawfully deliver or cause to be delivered by Hon. Mitchell Hepburn, knowing the contents thereof a letter threatening to kill the said Hon. Mitchell Hepburn."

J. W. McFadden appeared for the Crown when Primeau was brought before court in the City Hall today. He was taken to the Psychiatric Hospital following the court hearing.
