HE PREMIER AND THE DELEGATION.

To put it mildly there is a pretty general impression that Premier Peters was not quite happy in his reply to the temperance delegation which waited upon the Government on Wednesday last. At the very outset of his remarks he seemed to complain that the delegation was made up of too large a number. Under our democratic institutions in which we are fair to believe that we have "Government of the people, by the people and for the people", it seemed strange to object to the people making known their requests. It seemed ungracious to remind the many who were in attendance that their presence was neither expected nor desired. And we fail to see that the presence of a large number whose sole object was the better enforcement of a law enacted at the instance of the Government was evidence of a desire to dictate to the Government.

So far the Premier was not felicitous either in his attitude toward the deputation, in the words which he chose, or in the general tone of his remarks. He as head of the Government and especially in his official capacity as Attorney General, is more than any other man in Prince Edward Island responsible for securing the due observance of the laws. He ought therefore to welcome the friendly offices of the clergymen and the large number of sober and law-abiding citizens who seek only to aid him and his colleagues in that which it is their manifest duty to do. Mr. Peters made the impolitic mistake of meeting these people in what seemed a rather carping and unfriendly spirit. Certainly his closing remark, pointing to a possible repeal of the law if the temperance people do not hereafter enforce it better, was more calculated to please the men engaged in the illegal traffic than to gratify the friends of law and order to whom he was addressing himself.

But whether as the result of more mature deliberation, or the better counsels of the Premier's colleagues, the Government hastened to comply, in part at least, with the request of the delegates. Mr. Robert Jenkins is now appointed a Prosecutor, and the appointment, "should the appointee accept, will place prohibition matters in a much more hopeful light. We are grateful for what is done, perhaps none the less from the fact that the compliance with what was asked for contrasts somewhat strongly with the brusque reception accorded to the deputation. Our earnest hope is that hereafter Government and people may be drawn closer together in an earnest desire to make this a sober city with good laws honestly observed. The Government have done much in giving us a good law, with amendments when they were asked for, and now in appointing the prosecutor whom the temperance people desired. We place this to their credit, and we believe that in these matters they have carried out the well understood wishes of the people of the Island.

As is very clearly pointed out by W. P. Doull in a letter to an evening paper the Inspector of gas and electric lighting appointed by the Dominion has not the requisite powers to secure the safety of the City. His duties deal with voltage, candle power and meters, in other words to see that the customers who use gas or electric light receive the illumination which they pay for. We incline to the opinion of Mr. Doull, that the Recorder is wrong in stating that the City Council has not the power to appoint an inspector of wires. But if he is found to be right from a strictly legal point of view then legislation should be secured at the earliest possible moment to give the Council the appointing power. The recent fatal accident and the disclosures of the inquest make it plain that the City is in hourly peril of fire and fatal accident from the electric current. It would be strange indeed if we have no power to protect ourselves against such terrible dangers.

CAN PROVE AN ALIBI.

BOSTON, Nov. 5.—Allen C. Mason, the prominent clubman of this city, who was detained by the state police yesterday on suspicion of having murdered Miss Clara Mottin last Saturday, in Waverly, and on suspicion of having committed assaults on various women in Boston and vicinity, will undoubtedly be discharged today when his case comes up in the Cambridge court. It is understood that Mason has entirely cleared himself by proving an alibi, and that the police admit there is no evidence on which the man can be held.

WHY HE WAS DISMISSED.


ST. PETERSBURG, November 4th.—The dismissal from the Russian army of the grand Duke Paul Alexandrovitch, uncle of the czar, which was officially announced yesterday, was due to his recent marriage to the Baroness Pistoloff, with whom he has been acquainted for the past three years, and who got a divorce from her husband in order to marry the grand duke. It is said that the grand duke has also been banished from the Russian court for ten years. He will settle at Cannes, France.

ASKS FOR NEW TRIAL.

ST. JOHN, November 4.—In the supreme court, Fredericton, to-day, Mr. Mullin applied for a new trial for Higgins, sentenced to be hanged on December 18th. Some of the points taken appear to have impressed the judges. Judgment will be given later.
