**THE CITY COUNCIL AND THE PROHIBITORY LAW.**

Many citizens have read with surprise and regret the resolution moved by Coun. Brown seconded by Coun. Taylor and adopted by the City Council at their last meeting, practically instructing the Marshal and police to take no part in the enforcement of the Prohibitory Law. The resolution was adopted with only one dissentient vote—that of Councillor Tanton—and places the Council in an attitude of hostility to the law of the land. This action is, we believe altogether unprecedented contrary to sound public policy and in excess of the powers which the Council possess.

The Marshal and men of the police force are peace officers, and officers of the law, sworn to the discharge of their duties as such, and it is not within the power of the Council or of the Police Committee to absolve them from their public duties or from their oaths of office. But this by the way. The chief significance of the action taken lies in the fact that the Council have taken sides with the liquor interest with the clear object of breaking down the Prohibitory Law and sheltering as far as may be those who may hereafter violate its provisions. They seek to do this by excluding police officers from taking any part in the service of papers or the enforcement of this particular law.

No one who knows the men will suspect Councillors Brown and Taylor of having prepared the resolution which stands in their names. It bears the impress of another mind and other literary qualifications than theirs. Perhaps another Councillor, the brilliant legal light of the Chamber, could enlighten us as the authorship if he would, but that matters little. There is no doubt as to the Councillors named being very fully and heartily in accord with the resolution for which they stand sponsors, and there is equally little doubt that the Police Committee composed of Messrs. Angus McDonald, P. S. Brown and J. F. Whear, are fully in agreement with the instructions which they have received from the Council and are to pass on to the police.

The preamble to the famous resolution sets forth that the Prohibition Act was passed by the Legislature without consulting the Council (!) and that grave doubts exist as to the constitutionality of the said Act. These two "whereases" are so coupled together that we are left to infer that in the opinion of the civic Law Lords it may be unconstitutional for the Legislature to pass a law relating to Charlottetown without consulting the City Council. No doubt they will receive further light on that point at a later stage. But who advised the Council in regard to these "grave doubts"? Not the Recorder, or his written opinion would have been produced and read at the Council Board. We venture that the Council took counsel within themselves and with the wise heads of the Police Committee, and so reached the sapient conclusion that they are better versed in constitutional law than is the Minister of Justice who has pronounced the law valid and constitutional.

We have said that it is not within the legal powers of the Council to prevent the police from serving legal processes under any law within the City limits or to absolve the police from their oaths of office or legal duties. And we deny the right of the Council to pronounce any law unconstitutional. With all due respect we submit that they have no more authority or right to pronounce upon a question of constitutional law that has any body of

citizens who may casually meet at the street corner. Neither the courts of law nor the general public care a great what may be the doubts which City Councillors may have upon that question. Nor will their carefully nurtured doubts count for the weight of a straw in any division of either legal or public opinion.

The Councillors affect to be afraid of liability for damages in case of their police officials being connected with the enforcement of the law, should it turn out to be unconstitutional. It remains to be seen whether the Council have not incurred a much graver liability in directing the police not to carry out the law. Such duties as legally devolve upon the police they are obligated to discharge, and should the Council instruct the police to refuse a legal duty the City would be liable for the default. These are simple truths; of which the more intelligent members of the Council are no doubt fully aware.

Apart from the legal aspects and possible consequences of the Council's action, it may be observed that the famous resolution is quite well understood by the general public as a mere piece of "bluff". It is intended to thrust into the public mind the impression that the Prohibitory Law may not be valid and by that means to weaken its effective force. That is all. In the meantime there are abundant evidences that those who would like to go on selling liquor are themselves very much afraid that the law is entirely valid and that if they break it they must pay the penalties.

**THE CORONATION OATH.**

A Quebec despatch says: Two important questions were discussed by the the Anglican Diocesan Synod here yesterday. One related to the coronation oath, and was introduced by a resolution offered by E. T. D. Chambers expressing satisfaction with the appointment by the imperial parliament of a committee to consider and report upon the oath, hoping that means may be found to abrogate or amend it so that it may no longer be offensive to every Roman Catholic subject of the empire.

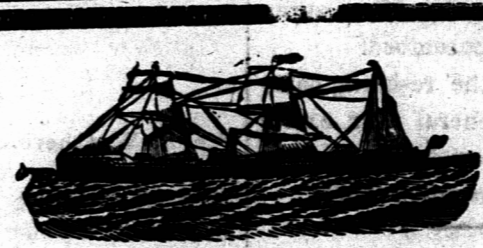

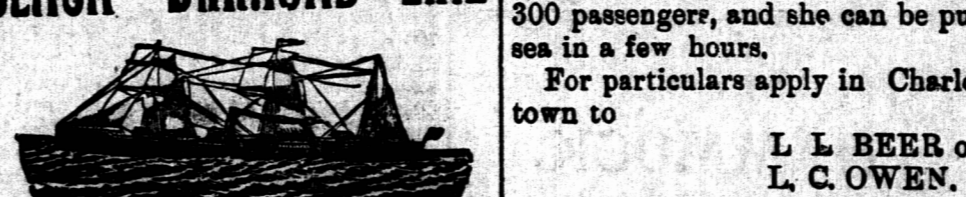
