NARROW ESCAPE—Awakened when police constable Allan McInnis broke down the door of their home with a key, the danger, Thomas Brown, his wife and two children, narrowly escaped burning to death in their home here yesterday. Fire caused by a defective fire set fit to the roof of the two storey house and flames shooting into the room, the flames attracted the attention of the patrolling policeman.
