Sensations Furnished In Opening Day Of Golf Meet; Somerville Eliminated

ST. ANNES ON SEA, May 20.—Sensations were immediately forthcoming when they started the week's golfing wars today in quest of the British Amateur Title, over the Royal Lytham and St. Anne's layout. Immediate elimination was the fate of C. Ross "Sandy" Somerville of London, Ont., former Canadian and United States titleholder. Also knocked out in the first round was the two Scottish favorites, Jock McLean and Hector Thomson. Lawson Little of San Francisco, starting defence of the title, had the narrowest of escapes. Five of the 10 Canadians gained their way into the second round, and three were defeated. Two others, Gordie Taylor of Montreal and Jack Nash of London, got into the first-round fray tomorrow.

SCORE SUCCESSES

Ken Black and Dick Moore of Vancouver; Bud Donovan of Winnipeg; Phil Farley of Toronto and Edward Innes of Montreal were the invaders from the Dominion who scored initial successes. Along with Somerville to the side-lines went F.C. Hoblitzel of Toronto and D. O'Donnell Higgins of Montreal, not an official member of the touring Canadian team.

Most decisive of the Canadian victories today was that of "the baby" of the team, 20 year old Daniel James Donovan, the Winnipeg flash. Young Mr. Donovan finished his affair with Walter Cressy of Worsley on the 19th green. The scoresheet standing five up and three to play.
Dick Moore was carried to the 10th hole before he could dispose of the Scotsman, Hector Thomson. In one of the best matches of the day, Thomson had been rated next to McLean and Little among the favorites. Moore won the first four holes and was still up at the turn and at the 11th he was five up. From there on Thomson showed a grand recovery. Dornie three, Moore lost the 16th, where he needed three putts from 10 yards out; the 17th, when he pulled his drive, and the 18th, when he failed to sink a four-footer from a halved hole. The 19th was halved, and the match was Moore's when the Scot got in trouble in the rough on the 20th.

ELEMINATES WATSON

Ken Black meantime was eliminating Dr. Watson of Royal Ashdown Forest Club by a tally of three and one.
Farley also won his match 3 to 1, eliminating W. H. Catterall who was playing his home course.
Edward Innes of Montreal showed a steady game, getting good length from the tees. He went into the lead at the fourth hole over D. Turner of Alderburgh, and was still one up at the turn. Turner had continual trouble with the bunkers on the way back and Innes finished with a margin of four up and two to go.
Sandy Somerville was rueful as he contemplated the abrupt collapse of his second challenge in the British amateur. Two years ago he progressed to the quarter finals. "I just played bad golf and deserved to lose," he said after finishing his

match with Leslie Halliwell, sharp-shooting golfer from Lancashire, on the wrong end of a 2 and 1 count.

Hoblitzel was vanquished by J. Zacharias of Formby, who finished one up, after being two down to the Canadian at the third hole. Higgins was eliminated by another trans-Atlantic entrant, Robert W. Knowles, Jr. of Brookline, Mass., 5 and 3.

FIRST UPSET

The first sensation of the day was the defeat of Jock McLean, Scottish and Irish champion, by 22 year old J. H. Bryant of Blackwell, Worcester-shire. Bryant, who knocked out the man considered by many as the best defender against the Overseas threat, took up golf four years ago after a dislocated hip had cut short his career in rugby football. McLean, off his form, could never hold the lead.
Big Lawson Little floundered all over Lancashire County, getting mixed up in practically everything except a cotton mill, before he finally won his opening match.
Paired against a gangling player named T. H. Parker, the Amateur champion of Britain and the United States and the 5 to 1 betting favorite managed to pull through by a score of one up in just about as distressing an exhibition of golf as he ever produced.

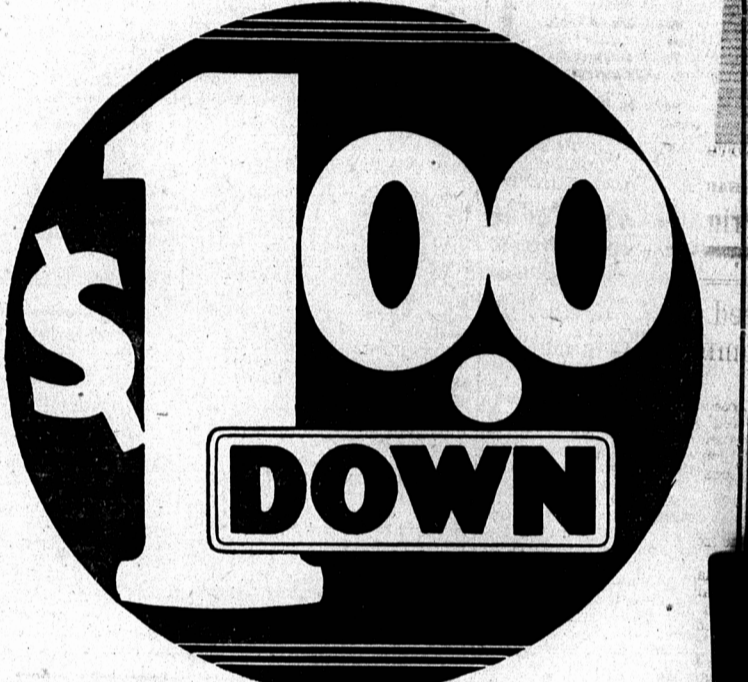
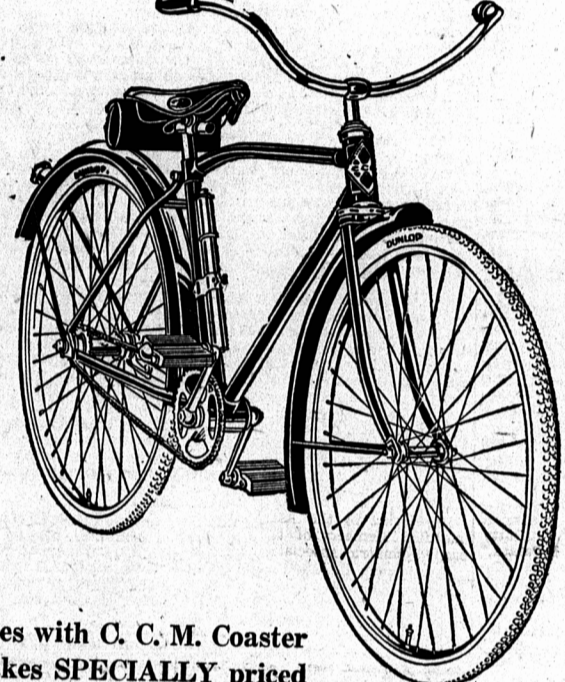
Col. Davison President Of Rifle Ass'n

Brief Military Sketch Of Leader Of Island Riflemen. Association Meeting Tonight.

The following is a brief military sketch of one of our most popular and highly regarded citizens, Lt.-Colonel H. M. Davison, V. D., President of the Prince Edward Island Rifle Association, who will preside at the annual meeting in the Board of Trade Rooms tonight.
Colonel Davison enlisted in the Engineers on the first of May, 1882. He was transferred to the Prince Edward Island Artillery in 1888 and assumed command of a company in 1889 (with the rank of Captain) which won honors in the competitions at Quebec that season.
He was selected as an officer for Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897 and the Coronation of King Edward in 1902.
In the competitions for the Governor General's Cup his battery was very frequently first, keen rivalry being given by a similar battery at Charlottetown.
In 1900 Captain Davison was promoted to second in command of the 4th Battalion (with the rank of Major) under Lt.-Colonel J. A. Longworth. On the death of Colonel Longworth in 1904 Major Davison assumed command of the 4th Regiment C. A. and continued in command until 1912 with the rank of Lt.-Colonel.
During that period the name and fame of the 4th Regiment went far afield and in the competitions with the other batteries of Canada first place almost invariably went to one or other of the Island batteries. Officers and men were selected as part of the All-Canadian Artillery team which competed against the British at Petawawa in 1907, two of Colonel Davison's officers being first and second in command in the record breaking shoot which the Canadian Heavy Artillery made on that occasion and which was responsible for the winning of the cup. One officer and several men were also part of the All-Canadian Artillery team which visited England in 1911 and won the King's Cup and other trophies from the British Artillery.
In 1912 notwithstanding the pleadings of the senior officers, Major Peake, Major Leigh and others, Colonel Davison believed that it was only fair that he should resign and give advancement to others, but while the officers and rank and file felt that they would be commanded by competent officers, yet they were very loath indeed to let the beloved Colonel resign.
The writer had the privilege of receiving the largest part of his militia officer's training under Colonel Davison and feels a deep debt of gratitude to him for the splendid instruction which he imparted, the fine example which he set and the high spirit of devotion to duty which he inculcated.
Prince Edward Island can feel justly proud of the Artillery officers it sent to the Great War. They were well trained and in a field of endeavor that called for qualities of leadership, determination and courage, together with a knowledge of a most intricate subject, they stood well in the opinion of their fellow Canadians.
Colonel Davison prior to assuming the Presidency of the Prince Edward Island Rifle Association, had distinguished himself as a rifle shot and won, through the various offices of the Association, being for many years Chairman of the Council under the Presidency of the late lamented Colonel F. S. Moore, another very fine soldier.
On the death of the latter he was elected President of an office in which he has continued ever since, although he has repeatedly asked to be allowed to resign. With him at its head the Association feel that they have a tower of strength to lean on in emergencies.

NEW YORK, May 20.—While the principals in the welterweight championship fight card, Jimmy McLarnin and Barney Ross, lolled about today in the restful quiet of their training camps in the Catskills, the supporting lineup for the May 29 bout was announced here.
The 20th Century Sporting Club made known that four six-round bouts and one four-rounder would make up the preliminary act to the championship drama in the Polo Grounds here.
The six-rounders will bring together Sixto Escobar, Puerto Rican favorite in Montreal rings, and Billy Archibald, speed-ball bantam from Providence; Paulie Walker, Trenton, N.J., and Mickey Serrian, New York, welters; Jackie Shanley, Minneapolis, and Lou Camps, New York, featherers; and Calvin Reed, Philadelphia, and Frankie Brown, New York, welters. Andy Miretsko, New York, and Ralph Vona, Asbury Park, N.J., will meet in the four-round curtain raiser. They are welterweights.
One-day vacations were enjoyed by champion McLarnin and Challenger Ross because their respective handlers did not want to bring them to top shape too early. With the third and rubber match between the two gamblers still eight days off, both were reported in good enough condition to enter the ring immediately.

Yankees Win Turbulent Game From White Sox 7-2; Indians Defeat Red Sox 4-1

NEW YORK, May 20.—New York Yankees lost an argument but won a ragged ball game at Yankee Stadium today at the expense of the league-leading Chicago White Sox.
The New Yorks made good use of their 10 hits off southpaw Carl Fischer, taking his first start for the Sox, and easily captured the first game of the series 7-2. Johnny Broaca throttled the burly looking visitors in the pinches, leaving 13 men stranded on the bases, and also was the cause of the day's big debate.
The Yankees protested with such violence when Umpire Bill McGowan called a balk on Broaca, in the seventh, that catcher Bill Dickey was ejected for using abusive language and pitcher Johnny Allen was banished from the bench for banging the front of the dugout with a bat. The argument, led by Manager Joe McCarthy and Captain Lou Gehrig, lasted nearly 10 minutes but had no bearing on the ultimate outcome.
INDIANS DEFEAT SOX
With Oral Hildebrand pitching effectively at Boston to register his second victory of the season Cleveland Indians defeated the Red Sox 4-1 in the series' opener. The victory coupled with the defeat of Chicago reduced the White Sox's margin over the Indians to 1 1/2 games.
The Sox got to Hildebrand for nine blows but the Cleveland right hander scattered them over as many innings and but for Rick Ferrell's homer in the sixth would have scored a shutout. Bob Grove pitched good enough ball to win most games. He held the Indians to four hits and one earned run in the eighth inning he was on the mound. The other run was the result of his own error in the second when the tribe scored their first run on an error by Dahlgren, a stolen base, a long fly

PIRATES TROUNCE GIANTS 11-4

NEW YORK, May 20.—Banging out eight extra base hits, including a homer by Forrest Jensen, five triples and two doubles, Pittsburgh Pirates overwhelmed New York Giants 11-4 today at Pittsburgh and Red Lucas started and won his first game of the season for the Bucs.
While Lucas was blanking the league leaders with three hits the first eight innings, the Pirates jumped on Carl Hubbell for five runs and six hits in the first four innings and then continued their battering at the expense of Allyn Stout and Frank Gabler.
The Giants' ruined Lucas' hopes of scoring a shutout when they pounded out five hits in the ninth, which with the aid of Vaughan's error gave them all of their runs.
Four double plays and three hits apiece by infielders Bill Jurgens and Phil Cavaretta let Chicago Cubs to a 5-0 triumph over Boston Braves in the opening game of the series at Chicago.
Backed by excellent fielding, Bill Lee pitched a six-hit shutout, allowing only two Braves to get to second base and none past.
With Jurgens contributing a pair of doubles and Cavaretta two singles, the Cubs bunched seven hits to score all their runs off Dutch Brandt in the second and third innings. Bob Smith then shut them out with three hits during the last five innings.
The defeat dropped the Braves into the league cellar. Babe Ruth, making his first appearance in Chicago as a National Leaguer, played left field during the first 5 1/2 innings of the game. In batting practice he drove in a couple over the right field wall, but he couldn't help his .155 batting average. Other games were rained out.
