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CARDIGAN EGG CIRCLE.

A very enthusiastic poultry meet- ing of the farmers of Cardigan and vicinity was held at Mr. Smith's sample room, Cardigan, on Thurs- day evening the 19th inst., for the purpose of forming an egg circle. Despite the unfavorable condition of the roads, there were a good num- ber in attendance each section of the surrounding country being fairly well represented. Mr. E. S. Norton, President of the ardigian Institute, occupied the hair and introduced the speaker, r. W. A. Brown, Chief of the Poultry Division, Ottawa, who gave a very intelligent address on the var- ious phases of the poultry industry and the marketing of eggs under the roposed egg circle system. The peaker in his opening remarks quot- ed the census for each decade of years, and pointed out how Canada hich formerly exported a consider- able quantity of eggs was now im- porting from 14 to 20 million dozens er year, which goes to show that he Canada is not keeping pace with the demand. Mr. Brown next spoke on the system from a financial standpoint and very clearly explained how the proposed system of selling eggs on a cash ba- sis was for superior to the old one. He explained and illustrated the pro- cess of candling, by which the least defect in an egg might be readily de- tected. In conclusion he explained ow the work of the circle and the marketing of eggs were carried on, and asked anyone present to ask any questions which they thought would be beneficial to them. A number of questions were propounded which ere satisfactorily answered by Mr. Brown. The Chairman asked that a motion be put to the meeting as to whether an egg circle be formed or not. It was accordingly moved by Michael Campbell that an egg circle be formed at Cardigan. The motion as seconded by James Quinn and unanimously carried. The constitu- tion and bye laws were next read by he chairman which when completed, ere unanimously adopted. It was ecided to call the egg circle the Cardigan Egg Circle and that the membership fee and dues be 50 cents respectively. The election of direc- tors next took place and the follow- ing directors were appointed:—Henry reen, Wm. McLellan, J. W. Scrimgeour, Domick Bowen, Patrick Blakey, Samuel McPherson, Angus McLeod, Auditors—Michael Campbell and Jas. Quinn. Mr. Brown explained hat he was engaged to address a eeting at Lorne Valley on the fol- lowing evening for the purpose of forming an egg circle there, and as hat place could possibly be covered y the Cardigan circle, he thought well to appoint delegates to at- tend the meeting to be instrumental in amalgamating Lorne Valley and ardigian under the one egg circle. he following delegates were appoint- ed:—J. W. Scrimgeour, Wm. McLel- an, Allan Shaw. It was moved by W. Scrimgeour, seconded by Jas. uign that a standing vote of thanks e tendered Mr. Brown for his able nd instructive lecture which was onformably done. On motion of ad- ourment the meeting then closed. fter the meeting the directors held meeting and as some of those ap- ointed were not present, they decid- d to leave the election of officers till next meeting which will be eld on the 31st, inst.

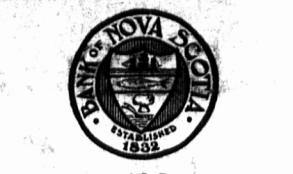
