Removal of Ban Re Influenza Epidemic in Country Districts

In consequence of the Governor General having proclaimed Sunday next, the 17th instant, as a day of national Thanksgiving and prayer on the termination of the war, and in order that the people of this Province may have an opportunity of showing their gratitude by participating in same, the ban and restrictions of the Provincial Board of Health closing the Churches and other places of worship in this province during the present Influenza Epidemic is hereby removed, excepting in such localities as in the opinion of the Local Board of Health it is not yet advisable in the public interests to remove the same, the date of removal shall be fixed and acted upon by the Local Board of Health.

The removal of such restrictions shall likewise apply to the Public Schools in this Province excepting in cases as above mentioned.

This Order does not apply to incorporated towns. In such places the removal of restrictions is left entirely in the hands of the Civic Boards of Health.

Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

The citizens of Lower Montague and vicinity were shocked when they learned that Whilmina Taylor, dearly beloved wife of Albert Wood of Dundas, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Taylor of Lower Montague, had passed to her eternal and blessed home on Thursday afternoon, October 17th, 1918.

The deceased had been in bed for about a year suffering from spine and hip trouble, and under the skilful treatment of Dr McIntyre of Montague, was able to be up around and visiting neighbors about four months before her death. The death occurred at Sumnerfield on Oct. 28th of Mr. Bernard E. Croken.

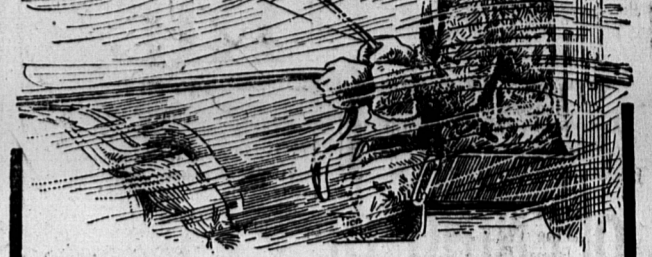
The deceased had reached the advanced age of eighty years, and ever possessed all the qualities which go to make up the Christian gentleman.
