HONEST SECOND HAND DEALER

MONTREAL, Oct. 2.—The conscience of a second hand dealer saves one of England's aristocracy \$25,000 and his family tree. Three days ago two men entered the second hand store of Julius Miller and sold a leather scrip and a pair of field glasses, getting \$8 all told. Miller later examined the bag and found in the pocket an envelope containing one hundred five pound notes, about \$2500 in Canadian money, the family tree, of Hon. Percy Holt and a number of documents relating to the family, one of which was of the date 1563. Miller says he was sorely tempted to keep the money, but after a wrestle with his conscience he phoned Chief of Detectives Carpenter. He found out that Hon. Percy Holt was on his way to Vancouver and his trunks were to be forwarded to him there. Part of his baggage, however, was stolen from the C.P.R. wharf.

Robert Hazelton, sentenced last week to ten years for the St. Croix Bank burglary, has been identified by a penitentiary warden as a man who served two years some time ago for stabbing a man near Quebec. He is also thought to have been one of the gang who robbed the jewellery store in Alexandria, Ontario, a year ago.
