R.A.F. Boxers Are Winners In Boxing Tournament With Men From R.C.A.F.

Chalking up victories in three bouts and gaining a draw in another while their opponents had to be content with a lone win boxers of the Royal Air Force last night defeated a team of RCAF mittslingers from the Summerside Airport in a tournament staged at the local Reconnaissance School. The tournament was a return engagement Summerside airmen having won the matches at Summerside about three weeks ago when they edged last night's winners five matches to four.

Last night the big crowd of airmen who witnessed the tournament scraps in addition to exhibition bouts by boys of the RAF saw a real slugfest in each and every match on the card with one knock-out and a technical knockout featuring the tournament.

Immediately after the boys were finished Group Captain E. A. Blake C.O. of the local airport congratulated the teams on their performances and highly complimented the Summerside airmen for their team together hurriedly in order to make the trip down from Summerside after having four of the boys who had taken part in the previous tournament laid up with illness.

All the bouts were handled in a capable manner by Flying Officer Wagner of the Summerside Airport and his work went over big with the crowd.

The first two bouts on the card were both exhibition affairs between Royal Air Force boys. In the first LAC. Gates after being held even in the first round came back to take the next heats by comfortable margins and gain a decision over AC. Ward. In the second bout LAC. Chown had a slight margin in the final two rounds to gain a close decision over A. Courage, the latter living up to his name by showing loads of courage all through the bout.

In the first inter-school contest LAC. Broomfield chalked up the first victory for the RAF by beating LAC. Pigeon of the RCAF by a judges decision. From the opening bell the two boys started mixing matters with Pigeon starting like a whirlwind to toss a hall of leather at his opponent. Broomfield weathered the opening storm however and came back strongly to gain an even break on the round. They battled on fairly even terms all through the second session with the space between them somewhat but in the final two minutes of fighting Broomfield had a distinct edge to crop the decision. A short flicking left by Broomfield was his near weapon in victory and at the end of the 1st he had his opponent bleeding from the nose.

The Royal Air Force made it two straight as LAC. Moore, the stiffest boxer on the card gave LAC. Turpin of Summerside a real boxing lesson in each round. Moore was always in control of matters and Turpin found him a very difficult target to hit solidly and as a result the RAF boy won by a comfortable margin.

LAC. Gasson made it three straight for the RAF and castured them of the tournament victory as he weathered a hall of leather in the opening minutes of the first round to beat his opponent Sergeant Finley of Summerside by a technical knockout after a minute and ten seconds of scrapping in the third round.

Finley starting very fast crowded his opponent continually for the first minute of the fight throwing rights and lefts that found their mark continually. Gasson, however, weathering the storm started to hurt his opponent in the final minute with ringing right hand wallops; all through the second Gasson kept hammering away to the head and body and just before the close a hard right to the chin sent Finley down. It looked like the fight was over but the count had just reached three when the bell saved the RCAF fighter. Finley came out apparently fresh for the final heat but a half minute after the start Gasson again started finding the range and referee Wagner stepped in and stopped the uneven match with Finley standing up courageously to a hard pounding.

Carrying dynamite in either fist LAC. Freel gave the visiting team its first victory—and its only one—as he kayped his opponent AC. Harding of the RAF after five seconds of scrapping in the third round. This bout like all the others started out like a regular slugfest. Freel a cool acting customer met punch for punch as Harding started off fast swinging leather from every direction and at the end of the second round Freel edged over a tough game opponent in Harding.

Freel's margin was much more noticeable in the second stanza as he punched his opponent almost at will and the end of the bout came suddenly in the third as Freel caught Harding with a hard right to the jaw that put the RAF boy down for the count of ten.

The last bout was the highlight of the card and after an extra round had been fought the referee called it a draw after the judges had again disagreed. The bout was between LAC. Walker of the RAF and LAC. Thomas of the RCAF. Both boys came out fast and Walkie connecting with a hard right cross sent Thomas toppling to the canvas for an eight count. Thomas getting back on his feet was still very much in the running and for the remainder of the regulation three rounds the pair fought it out on close terms. There was no more semblance of knock-down but the spectators present were kept in excitement all the time as the boys hammered each other over the ring. The bout was declared a draw after the third round and it was decided to go an extra round of one minute to try and determine a winner but after the end of the sixty seconds of milling the judges again failed to agree and the referee called

ed the bout a draw a decision that met with instant approval.

The RCAF orchestra enlivened the proceedings greatly by various selections before and during the progress of the bouts, the entire audience joining in a communitary singing between the staging of the fourth and fifth bout of the evening.

Blue Bombers Retain title

WINNIPEG, Nov. 16 (CP)—Winnipeg Blue Bombers dominated the mantle of Western football supremacy for the fifth consecutive year Saturday when Ches McCance kicked two field goals out of the mud at Osborne Stadium to beat Regina Roughriders 8-2 in the rubber game of a two-of-three series.

This Bombers earned the right to quest eastward in search of the Dominion championship at the Grey Cup they won in 1935 and 39, beating Hamilton Tigers and Ottawa Rough Riders. This year the Eastern finalists will be either Hamilton Wildcats or Ottawa.

Bombers snatched back the challenge of probably the greatest team of "West" fans produced. Regina with graduates of junior clubs in starry roles, turned back the Bombers 8-6 at Regina Nov. 8 and lost 18-12 last Tuesday on a four-quarter touchdown. Former United States players were outstanding in Winnipeg's ultimate triumph.

It was a battle between two great lines he-e yesterday as backfielders found poor traction on the greasy gridiron, softened by a mid-week thaw and drenched by Friday's heavy rain. Roughriders made only one first down and 82 yards rushing while Bombers made five and 127. Riders tried only four forward passes and completed one for 12 yards while Winnipeg completed three in 15 tries for 50 yards.

Miners blank Sydney to take Over League lead

SYDNEY, N.S., Nov. 17 (CP)—Gloucester Miners took over undisputed possession of leadership of the Cape Breton Hockey League tonight as they coasted to a 3-0 victory over Sydney Millionaires in a listless match.

The Dollarsmen were none too brilliant offensively and their forwards failed to click on the few scoring chances they had. Goalie Ken MacKinnon rang up his second shutout of the young season over the champions.

Les Ramsay opened the scoring in the first period while Sydney was a main short. Defenceman Charlie Phillips tallied early in the second on a shot from the red line that drifted past Dinny McManus' outstretched hand.

The Sydney goalie had no chance on the last score as Jack McBeth, parked almost in the crease, slapped home Boote Baird's passout. The goal came late in the middle session.

Millionaires Threatened with Suspension

SYDNEY, N.S., Nov. 17 (CP)—Sydney Millionaires of the Cape Breton Hockey League have been threatened with suspension from the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, but the deadline of C.A.H.A. President George Dudley's suspension ultimatum has expired apparently without further action from the Association head.

A telegram from Dudley made public today ordered Millionaires to return defenceman Eddie Patzer to Yorkton (Sask.) Terriers, who refused to grant him a release to transfer to Sydney. "Unless I receive assurance from you that this has been done no later than Friday (Nov. 14) I shall have to suspend both your club and Patzer," the President's message said.

The club however, apparently is standing pat on the case. The defenceman is still with them, though not playing pending clarification of his status. The Post-Record quoted him as saying he intended remaining here.

Meanwhile, trouble has developed over another Millionaire import, Bill Reay, professional with Omaha in the American Association last year who is seeking amateur reinstatement. Detroit Red Wings and Reay's no contact, and have ordered him to report to Quebec Aces of the Quebec Senior Hockey League.

"The player has refused to report to Aces, claiming that if he is reinstated Wings will have no further control over him. He also is remaining on the sidelines for the present."

TORONTO, Nov. 16 (CP)—Ottawa Rough Riders fought back from two crushing first-half setbacks and playing secured a last-minute victory over the Argos in a quarter field goal and a last-play on Saturday to eliminate Toronto Argonauts from the Eastern Canadian Football play-down.

In a spine-tingling finish that had 21,000 fans in Varsity Stadium on their feet, Arnie McWaters punned a good line single that gave Ottawa a 10-17 victory in this year's total points play-off. The victory gave Riders the two-game round 18-17 and qualified them for the Wildcats of the Ontario Union next Saturday.
