### IN MEMORIAM

#### GORDON E. HASLAM

Gordon E. Haslam, 62, of 27 Ontario street, well known business man and prominent in Masonic circles, died at the Osteopathic Hospital of Rhode Island, on Nov. 15, 1935 in Providence, Rhode Island, after a week's illness.

Mr. Haslam was a resident of this city for 40 years, and for the last 35 years had conducted the Haslam Heating and Ventilating Company at 797 Eddy street.

He was a past Grand Regent of the Grand Council of Rhode Island Royal Arcanum, and was a member of Moshassuck Council of that organization. He was a vice president of the Providence Rotary Club.

His Masonic affiliation included membership in Doric Lodge, No. 38 A.F. and A.M. of Auburn; Harmony Chapter of Pawtuxet, Doric Council No. 7, Auburn of which he was a past master; St. John's Commandery, Palestine Shrine and the Scottish Rites.

Mr. Haslam was born on Prince Edward Island, March 27, 1873, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph E. Haslam. On coming to this city he went into the steamfitting business and later started his own company.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Na Belle Knapp Haslam, a son, G. Raymond Haslam of this city; his father, Joseph E. Haslam of Prince Edward Island; three brothers, Richard Cecil and Louise C. of Providence, and Milledge of Nova Scotia; a sister, Mrs. Muriel Galvin of P. E. ### Two Killed In Level Crossing Accident

TORONTO, Nov. 24.—Robert Miller, 78 years old, first farmer president of the Canadian National Exhibition and one of Ontario's foremost livestock producers, and Mrs. Miller were killed today when their motor car was struck by a train at the Canadian National Railways level crossing at Langstaff, a few miles north of here.

Mr. and Mrs. Miller were on their way from their home at Stouffville to visit Mr. and Mrs. John A. McLeod in Toronto. Mr. McLeod is President of the Bank of Nova Scotia. They also had intended to visit their only son, Barcolow, at Hamilton.

Mrs. Miller, second wife of Mr. Miller, was 51 years old. The car in which they were riding was smashed and both were killed instantly.

### Lady Tweedsmuir Upholds Modern Literature

MONTREAL, Nov. 24.—Assurance of a happy five years in Canada was given Lady Tweedsmuir here Saturday as 700 women heard the consort of the Governor-General in her first public address since arriving in the Dominion.

Delight at the prospect of taking up the Canadian nationality and mingling with people of Canada was expressed by Lady Tweedsmuir, attractive in a rose velvet gown with a corsage of orchids.

A vigorous support was given to modern literature by Her Excellency, who contended that she termed the popular conception that modern poetry and prose were of little value. "Literature of our own time has an appeal that the past did not contain," she said.

"War poems have a depth and beauty that have never been equalled since," Lady Tweedsmuir told her audience. Many, though dismissed with a shrug, had a note of their own which was like "a thrust in the golden dusk."

Most of the modern poets "don't bother with moons, June and love," but they were still touching even though their theme may be factories and machine guns. "They have a certain courage and starkness of outlook which draws us to them," she concluded.

### Ducks Trapped In Sticky Crude Oil

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 24.—Countless hundreds of wild ducks, caught in a floating mass of sticky crude oil, faced almost certain death tonight by exhaustion or starvation on the waters of New Haven harbor.

Their breath and flight feathers matted by the gummy substance which has formed an emulsion with the salt water, the birds are floating helplessly ashore near West Haven and at other points near this city.

Efforts by shore residents to remove the oil with gasoline and warm, soapy water have proved only partially successful.

In many instances, the waterfowl are fatigued beyond recovery, but a few have been washed, fed and released at fresh water ponds in the vicinity.

Ray E. Benson, a member of the advisory council, state board of fisheries and game, described the oily mass as being liquid asphalt. He said the state board would investigate the source of the oil, believed to have escaped from a tanker which sank recently off the middle breakerwater.

### Mystery Blaze On Waters Causes Stir

People in the vicinity of the electric light plant witnessed an unusual spectacle on Friday evening last about 7.30 when they saw flames and smoke coming from the North West corner of the pond adjacent to the plant. Apparently the water was on fire. On closer inspection it was found that black carbon or waste from the exhaust pipes had been swept by the wind to that corner of the pond and someone had taken the trouble to set fire to it.

Employees at the plant say it takes a good big fire to start the waste burning. They had been cleaning out the pit into which the exhaust pipes drain and some of the carbon escaped and floated out on the pond. Evidently someone conceived the idea of lighting a fire, set light to the waste.

The skating sheds were in danger but as the fire only lasted a few minutes no damage was done.

The Town Fire Brigade was called out, but on their arrival they found that the troubled waters of the pond prevented no menace to adjacent property the fire having died down of its own accord.

There was a tremendous blaze while it lasted and to people at a distance it looked as if the entire east end of the town was on fire.—S

### Exploitation Of Maritimes Condemned

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 24.—Labor either organized or unorganized, employed or unemployed in Maritime Provinces cannot expect a return to a degree of prosperity or normalcy while 85 cents of every New Brunswick or Maritime produce dollar goes to Ontario, Quebec and the West, never to return, with the price of commodities in the Maritimes greatly advanced as a result of highly protected customs and tariff structures.

Delegates to the semi-annual meeting of the New Brunswick council of labor here Saturday evening and today heard the president, Ronald J. Harrington, Saint John, couple this declaration with an assertion that the Maritime provincial governments should demand full and immediate implementation of Confederation promises and agreements.

"Social or economic stability can never be hoped for, much less attained, until New Brunswick in conjunction with her sister Provinces of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island formally and emphatically demand that the deliberate and persistent exploitation of Maritimes be stopped," declared Mr. Harrington. "Under present existing conditions we are suffering from an 85 per cent adverse balance of trade that has stifled the development of our primary and secondary industries."

### Crew Reach Shore Safely

HALIFAX, Nov. 24.—Drifting helplessly at the mercy of the Atlantic when the Lunenburg fishing smack roser was disabled, Captain Allan Mosher and his crew of nine abandoned the craft 18 miles from shore in four dories and reached safely only after fighting heavy weather, the Captain said in Halifax today.

"We had to abandon her or take a chance of getting picked up some day," he said, adding the vessel had been set adrift after the crew was safely over the side of the dories.

The 35-ton fishing schooner was abandoned Friday and the crew struggled against the gale for seven hours before reaching Port Dufferin late that night. They were brought to Halifax by the motorvessel Mar-lis.

### Kossievonoff New Premier Of Bulgaria

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Nov. 24.—George Kossievonoff, former Minister of Foreign Affairs, became the new Premier of Bulgaria yesterday in another of the lightning political upsets characteristic of Bulgarian politics.

After a four-hour conference with King Boris, Kossievonoff announced formation of a Cabinet following the resignation of the government of Andrea Tosechiff because of disagreement on internal policies.

Political observers expressed the opinion Kossievonoff would speed up Boris' plan for a new constitution which would eliminate political parties and create the guild form of the State.

### Major Jewel Robbery Is Thwarted

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—Six men, said by police to be master criminals, were arrested early today while attempting to loot the Jewellers' Exchange on the Bowery.

Between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000 in jewelry lies hidden in safes in the group of offices comprising the exchange. Detectives characterized the burglary attempt as one of the most ambitious crime plots in the city's history.

The prisoners were: Charles Cohn (Charlie Cole), 39; Philip (Crooked Neck) Ziegler, 38; Peter Kobac, 46; Max (MacKey) Price, 43; Jack (The Ox) Pinkel, 33; and William (Dummy) Taylor, 46. All gave metropolitan addresses.



Each was charged with burglary, possessing burglars' tools, and violation of the Sullivan law.

The six were arrested as they fled from the exchange building, leaving behind two kits of burglars' tools and two loaded revolvers. Police said none of the many safes had been bored. The presence of a jeweler, who slept overnight in his office, halted their work.
