GENERAL

Although interrupted by rains threshing is well advanced in the three Prairie Provinces. Deliveries of grain to the country elevators are heavy and the grades thus far have been better than last year.

MARITIME PROVINCES

NEW BRUNSWICK — Crops generally good. Potatoes below average quantity but of fair quality. Hay generally good. NOVA SCOTIA — Season satisfactory for all crops but apples which will be small crop of but fair quality.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Grain 90% of average crop. Roots 80%. Potatoes 90%. Hops 100%. Hop picking is more than half completed. Okanagan apple crop estimate 60% of average now confirmed. McIntosh apples are all in and winter varieties are being harvested under ideal weather conditions. Pasturage improved but still below average.

EDMONTON DISTRICT

Threshing interrupted by rains but weather now clear generally. CALGARY DISTRICT — Two weeks rain delayed threshing. Some sprouting reported. Weather now clear. LETHBRIDGE DISTRICT — Heavy rains stopped threshing which was about 25% completed and caused considerable sprouting. Weather now clear. NORTHERN SASKATCHEWAN — Wet weather has delayed threshing and lowered grades in some districts. About 30% of wheat threshed. Yield slightly better than expected. Wheat will average from 16 to 13 bushels per acre. Little coarse grain has been threshed. SOUTHERN SASKATCHEWAN — Weather generally favourable for threshing up to end of last week. About 70% of wheat threshed and will average about 14 bushels per acre. Grain grading well, as no damage from frost. No shortage of labour. MANITOBA DISTRICT — Threshing has been delayed by rains during the past week. Estimated about 60% of wheat threshing completed. Deliveries continue heavy and crop movement is two weeks ahead of last year.
