

RUSSIAN DUMA WILL FORCE GOVERNMENT

To Face Their Challenge—Legislation will be Introduced to Abolish The Death Penalty —If Government Refuse it War will Result

St. Petersburg, May 31.—(Special)—Determined not to permit the Government to ignore their challenge, the members of parliament have decided to introduce legislation to abolish the death penalty which the Government refused to do.

The Bill will be ready June 9, and will be put through speedily. If the Government refuses to sanction it, Parliament will take steps to enforce the law on its own account, which action will undoubtedly mean civil war.

COLLISION ON THE ST LAWRENCE

Steamer With Barge in Tow Run into by Another—Five People Drowned

COURTBOURNE, Ont., May 31.—(Special)—About 3 30 o'clock this morning when the steamer Erin, bound up, with the large Donfori in charge, was rounding a bend in the St. Clair river about a mile south of here she was struck amidships by a steamer bound down. The Erin sank almost immediately in twenty feet of water. Amos Chester, Fred Chester and Charles McLeod, fishermen, on the Canadian side being close at hand saved six people. The rest consisting of the Chief engineer, one fireman, the first mate, a woman cook, and one late passenger were drowned.

DR. FOLEY NEW ARCHBISHOP

ROME, May 30.—The congregation of the Propaganda has decided to propose to the Pope the appointment of the Rev. Wm. J. Foley, of Tusket Wedge, (N.S.) to be Archbishop of Halifax, (N. S.)

Dr. Foley is a native of Halifax and is now in charge of the parish of Hillsboro, having been transferred there a few months ago from Tusket Wedge. Leaving the Halifax schools, he entered the Grand Seminary of Quebec where he studied for the priesthood and received the degree of doctor of divinity.

After his ordination he was attached to St. Mary's cathedral in Halifax. It is not known whether or not Dr. Foley was nominated by the meeting of bishops that considered the question of a successor to Archbishop O'Brien.

The details of that meeting are secret. Dr. Foley's name, however, was not prominent in the outside speculation as to the successor of Archbishop O'Brien. Dr. Foley at the time left Halifax for Tusket Wedge was spiritual director of the C. M. B. A. He is about thirty-seven years old.

BOMB THROWN AT KING OF SPAIN'S WEDDING

Misses the Royal Carriage but Kills and Maims a Number of the Escort—The King and Queen Preserve their Composure—The Bomb was Diverted By an Electric Wire Which it Struck.

MADRID, May 31.—(Special)—While the Royal party was returning from church after the wedding ceremony today, a desperate attempt was made to assassinate King Alfonso and his new Queen. A bomb was thrown just missing the royal carriage, and bursting in the midst of the gorgeous cavalcade. An officer and two men of the King's escort were instantly killed.

The appearance of the Princess who was about to become their Queen, aroused the people to the highest pitch of emotion. Men and women cheered and shouted, salutations while others from the balconies of houses along the route showered flowers on the Princess and let loose hundreds of pigeons carrying long bright streamers.

litters to bear the mangled bodies of the dead and wounded, while dense crowds pressed frantically around. Through it all the King and Queen maintained unshaken composure and after another carriage had been procured were driven safely to the Palace. LATER.

The royal carriage was shattered, one of its horses killed, and scores of the bystanders were horribly injured. The Royal couple escaped all injury. The wedding was celebrated with unprecedented pomp and splendor. The wedding cortege started from the Royal Palace at 9.30 a. m. amid the ringing of the church bells, firing of artillery salutes, and clamorous enthusiasm of the crowds massed along the route.

The bride looked most charming and gratefully acknowledged the continued ovations. The church was filled envoys, foreign ministers and others entitled to admission and at 11 o'clock the marriage of the King to Princess Eugenie Victoria took place with all the splendors of Catholic Church. In passing Mayor Street on return a bomb was thrown from above. It hurtled over the heads of the crowd and exploded with terrific force close to the royal carriage.

Three officers, and six soldiers around the royal carriage were torn to pieces. The Marquis of Celos and her daughter and Don Antonio Calvo who accompanied the party were among the killed. But for the fact that an electric wire deflected the bomb it would have struck its royal target. The bomb was thrown from the second story window of a boarding house from a room taken May 22, by a man from Barcelona named Moral, who has been arrested with several others.
