'SIDE BOARD OF TRADE REPLIES TO PRES. ADDRESS

(Continued from page 1.)

bringing to a successful issue so many important questions which had been pending for so many years.

(2.) Your Committee are especially gratified at the success of the L. Bd in securing for this port the services of boats of two steamship lines and they cordially approve the suggestion of the President that vigorous and prompt action should be taken to have the dredging operations resumed next summer for the purpose of straightening the channel of the harbor and to this end they suggest the appointment of a strong and energetic committee to press this matter on the Department of Public Works.

(3.) Your committee further advise that renewed efforts be made by the Council to have the Department of Railways get their water supply from the town system, that every possible effort be made to have the station accommodations at Summerside improved, and to have the appropriation placed in the estimates this year for repairs and additions to the Railway Wharf materially increased so that this wharf may be put in a reasonably satisfactory condition for the convenience and safety of the travelling public.

(4.) We concur with the President's remarks as to the satisfactory working of the railway time-table for last year and in his suggestion of time of departure of train from Summerside.

(5.) Your committee desire to congratulate the officers and members of the Board on the material increase in the membership and the satisfactory condition of the finances of the Board, not a little of which they believe to be due to the energy and persistence of the collecting agent.

(6.) One of the most important and significant points made in this very suggestive address is in reference to the position of Summerside as the commercial centre for the Province and the consequent necessity of facilitating and improving our communication not only on the water-side with other ports but also, by our public highways, with the farming community to the back of us. The attention of the Board has hitherto been mainly directed to the former of these, while little attention has been given to the latter. The President now, we think wisely, urges the necessity of improving the main public highways leading to the town so as to facilitate the hauling of farm products to Summerside shippers and in this we cordially agree with him. We would suggest that the Board now direct its attention to the improvement of these roads—and first the portion thereof under the control of the Town of Summerside, and then that under the control of the local Government.

(7.) Your committee has read with

much interest the views advanced in the President's address on the question of Education in this Province; but while they are in accord with much that is therein stated, they have some doubts as to the wisdom or expediency of this Board's committing itself to any academic theories on education or dissipating its energies on theoretical questions while so much remains to be done pertaining to the more legitimate objects for which the Board of Trade exists. With the complicated question of education and what are the proper studies for schools and colleges they feel that this Board may not be sufficiently conversant to make any pronouncement or to tender any advice as to the educative values of certain subjects of study, and they believe that the Board will, for some time to come, find ample scope for its activity in questions pertaining to trade and commerce and such other kindred matters as may contribute to the material advancement and welfare of the town and county.

(8.) We heartily approve of the recommendations made by the President relative to merchant's day excursions, the improvement of our public roads, the systematic inspection of all classes of foodstuffs offered for sale and the condition of stables, slaughter houses and grocery stores where these are produced or handled. The suggestion of the President in reference to securing the best quality of exports from this Province is also highly commendable. All these recommendations your committee believe are worthy of the best efforts of this Board to secure their realization and they suggest that this Board in conjunction with other Provincial Boards of Trade take such steps as may be found expedient to have them carried into effect.
