The prices are as follows: Parsnips 80 to \$1.00 per bus; Carrots, 60 to 80c. per bus; cabbage 45 to 60 per bus; turnips 12 to 20 per bus; potatoes 35 to 48 per bus; onions 3 to 5 cents per lb.
