CENTRAL GUARDIAN Officers Of Light Horse Take Course

Officers of the P. E. I. Light Horse unit are attending an officers' training course each Sunday morning and afternoon in Charlottetown. About 30 officers are attending the classes which are being conducted by Lt.-Col. G. E. Full, V.D., A.D.C. These officers have been appointed on the occasion of the re-organization of the Light Horse as a Reserve Regiment. The unit was recently re-organized by Lt.-Col. W. Johnstone and comprises 1,000 men, which is 50 per cent more than the original number called for the Reserve Army in this province. Major D. F. Tierney has recently been attached to the regiment as Assistant Instructor and Lieut. Keir Duggan returns to the unit as Adjutant. The training required from the officers is 45 nights at the local headquarters, 10 full-day schemes and 15 days under canvas. The training this week will include, in addition to the training at night, N.C.O.'s classes for headquarters squadron this evening; for "C" squadron (King's County) at St. Peter's on Tuesday and for "B" squadron (Prince County) on Friday. After Wednesday afternoon and evening, a squadron and headquarters, and attached groups, will hold tactical exercises west of Charlottetown. A similar exercise will be held in the vicinity of Kensington for Prince County on Wednesday and on Thursday the exercises for "C" squadron will be held at St. Peter's. Last week all the officers and N.C.O.'s attended an exercise west of Charlottetown.

Sudden Death Of Mr. T. L. Smith Here

The sudden death of Mr. Thomas L. Smith, 78-year-old Charlottetown storekeeper, which occurred at his home, yesterday morning, came as a shock to his many friends. He was enjoying his usual good health on Saturday but was suddenly stricken yesterday morning and died before medical aid could be summoned. Born in Charlottetown, the deceased lived here most of his life and was a highly respected citizen. As a young man he entered the employ of the Prince Edward Island Railway as a machinist. After spending 15 years at this trade, he left it to open a grocery store. For the past 40 years he has conducted a successful business on the corner of Sydney and Cumberland Streets in the city. He was an active member of St. Dunstan's Basilica and has been a member of the Holy Name Society of the parish for many years. He is survived by his wife, formerly Mrs. E. McQuillan, his daughter, Mrs. Thomas B. Creighton, and three grand-children. The funeral will be held from his late residence, 294 Sydney Street, Tuesday morning at 8:45 to St. Dunstan's Basilica, thence to the Roman Catholic Cemetery.

THE KIRK OF ST. JAMES

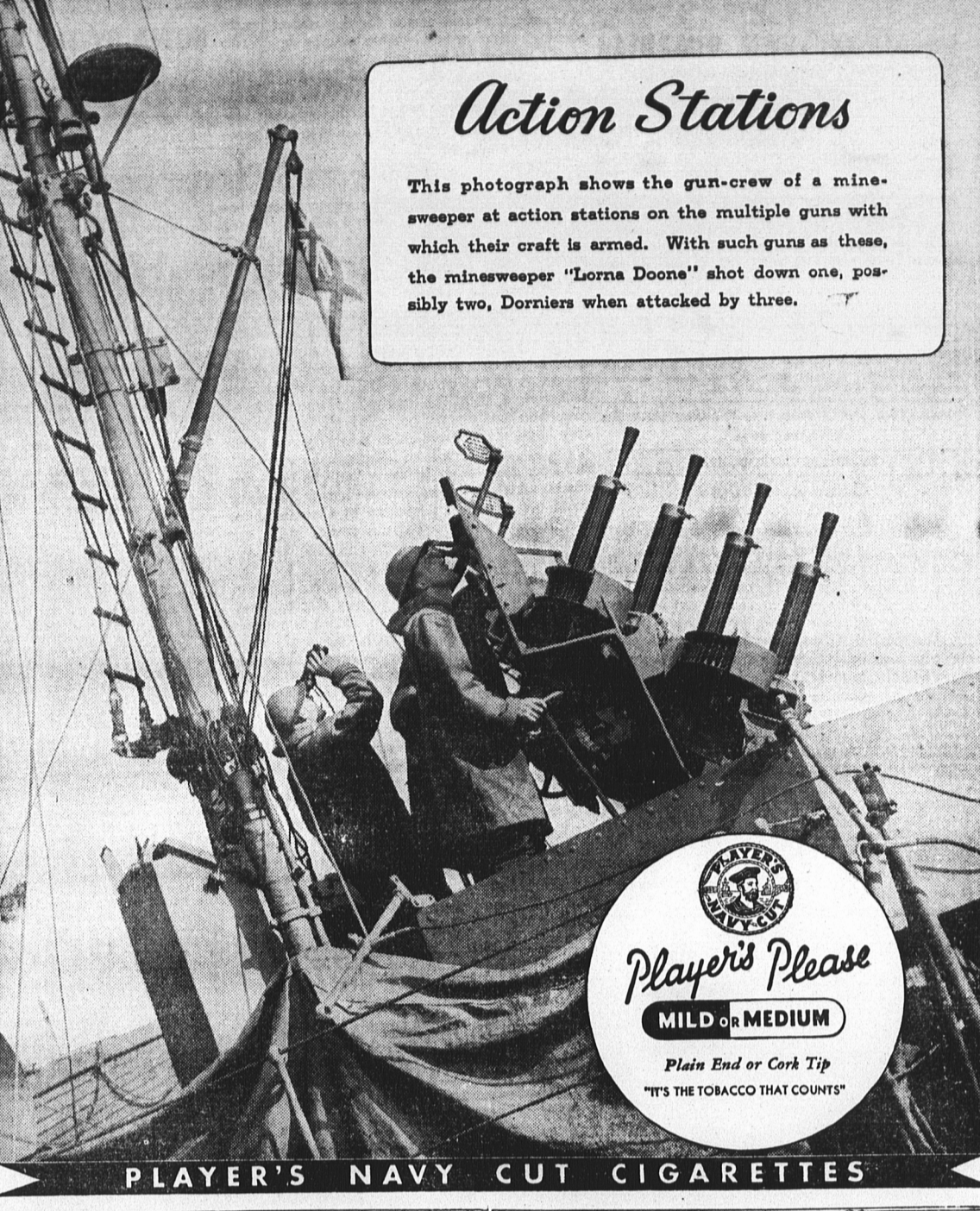

A motor boat in which they were cruising about the harbor suddenly stopped "dead" as they were racing for the shore leaving them at the mercy of the weather and tide. Most of the passengers were teen age boys and they quickly became alarmed at their plight. Waving a shirt on a pole, they succeeded in attracting the attention of a resident of Rocky Point who phoned the City Police. Constables Gordon Poole and Peter Walsh hurried to the waterfront in search of a boat to go to the rescue. Fortunately Mr. Elmer Gallant, a diver from Borden, was at the Marine Wharf and quickly put his boat to sea. When they reached the boat which was stalled in the harbor, they threw the boys a line and towed it back to the city. It appears the water splashing in over the boat caused the wires of the engine to get wet and stopped the motor. The boat was "shipping a lot of water" when police arrived. It was a small motor boat in charge of Mr. Joseph Gallant who had the boys out for a sail.
