AN EXPLANATION.

The Guardian apologizes for the unsatisfactory print of some of its pages from day to day. It is the fault of the press nor of any member of the staff, but as the former is an American manufacture the rollers for the distribution of the ink had, until a short time ago, been obtained from an American firm. Recently owing to the almost prohibitive interpretation of the duty on this class of goods, an order was placed in Canada for a partial set of rollers, and only after some days use was it discovered that the trouble is being caused by their being slightly smaller than those of American make. Owing to this difference in size it is impossible to regulate the ink properly from the Rural Daily to the Morning Daily and vice versa, and in consequence some of the pages of the latter print too light or are "smudged," while those of the former contain too much ink. An additional letter part of December, and as telegrams have since been kept going to the manufacturers in Toronto to run with all possible speed, it can be but a short time until the trouble is remedied.
