CARDINAL PACELLI SENDS HIM LETTER ANNOUNCING CONFERRING OF BLESSING BY HOLY FATHER

He was an especial guest at functions held by the Knights of Saint Columbanus of Ireland. In Liver pool he was one of three guests honored at a banquet held by the Knights of Saint Columbanus. While in Rome he received many courtesies from Joseph A. Andreoli, secretary in charge of the Knights of Columbanus headquarters in Rome.

Seed Cleaning Plant For Charlottetown

Recently a number of interested seed growers met and organized a company to be known as The Island Seeds, Incorporated. It is the intention of this company to use the building formerly owned by the P. E. I. Grass Seed Growers which has since been taken over, and it is understood that machinery now being installed which will be capable of cleaning Bent Grass seed, Timothy seed, Clover seed, Turnip seed and the different varieties of grains.

This plant will be under very efficient management and supervision. The President of the organization is Mr. W. H. MacGregor of St. John's, who has been a director of the Canadian Seed Growers' Association for a number of years and has also held a position on the Dominion Advisory Seed Board. The Vice President is Mr. E. B. McLaren of Georgetown who has been a director of the P. E. I. Potato Growers' Association ever since its organization. The Secretary, Mr. Earl Foster, is also a member of the Canadian Seed Growers' Association and thoroughly familiar with the requirements of seed grading. Additional directors are Mr. E. H. Howatt of Wilshire, Mr. W. J. Reid of Kinkora and Mr. E. J. Bruce of East Baltic.
