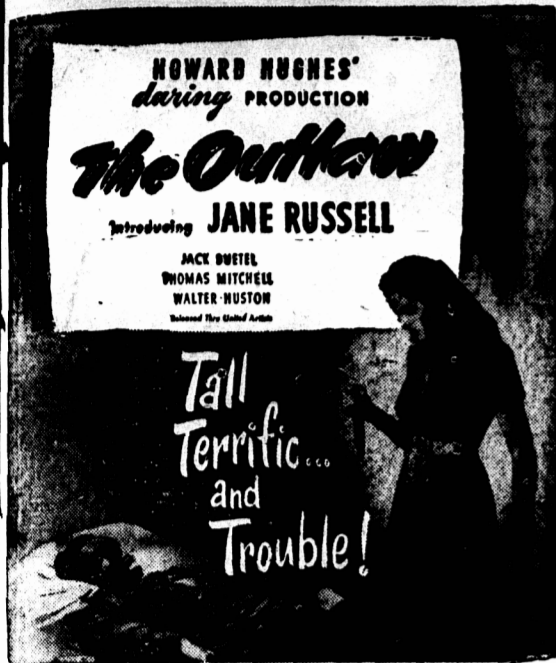

To Alberta, Lord Bennett's ad-
opted province, he contributed ab-
undantly to the foundation build-
ing of her institutions. The his-
tory of this province bears ample
evidence of his talents and energy
in promoting the general inter-
ests of the province's place in the
Canadian confederation.
Chief Justice Horace Harvey of
the Alberta Supreme Court said
"in the death of Viscount Ben-
nett there has passed away one
who for many years occupied a
very prominent place in the pub-
lic life of Alberta and later of all
Canada."
Premier Manning said that Vis-
count Bennett "will long be re-
membered as one of Canada's
most distinguished statesmen and
a great Empire builder."

ampson to New York about the
middle of August. To enable the
pastor and wife to make this ex-
tended trip the Baptist Church
here granted a month's leave of
absence. Attending the Congress
which is on a purely voluntary
basis are five or six from the Mar-
itimes and it is believed that about
25 or 30 will attend from the rest
of Canada. Mr. Davison who as-
sumed the pastorate of the Bap-
tist Church the first Sunday in
June has begun his work with en-
thusiasm and his congregation are
very pleased that he is to be priv-
ileged to enjoy the experience of at-
tending this great World Baptist
gathering, and they look forward
with keen anticipation to his lead-
ership in the local church when he
returns in September.
Mr. Davison was born in Mon-
cton, N.B. where he received his
early education. He spent one year
at U.N.B. and later entered Acadia
University where he received his
B.A. and B.D. degrees in 1937 and
1939.
In college Mr. Davison was lead-
er of many student activities, par-
ticularly debating and athletics.
He was also editor of the Acadia
University year book for 1938.
Previous to his call to Charlot-
teton to succeed Rev. I. Judson
Levy, he was pastor of the First
Baptist Church at Springhill, N.
S. Mrs. Davison, who was formerly
Enid Patterson, daughter of Dr. F.
W. Patterson, president of Acadia
University, was born in Winnipeg.
She was educated in the Wolfville
schools, Horton Academy and
Acadia University, receiving her
B.A. degree in 1938. She is an ac-
complished pianist and organist.
The Davisons have three children,
Judith, seven, Frederick, three,
and Jonathan one.
During the absence of Rev. and
Mrs. Davison from Charlotteton
the pastorate will be occupied by
Rev. Evan M. Whidden, professor
of Church History at Acadia Uni-
versity, and by Mrs. Whidden and
family. Professor Whidden is a son

of the former Chancellor of Mc-
Master University, Hamilton and is
a graduate of that institution. He
studied also at Edinburgh and
briefly in Germany. Mr. Whidden
has held pastorates in Western
Canada and was minister of a
Winnipeg Baptist Church before
becoming teacher of bible and
church history at Brandon Col-
lege, Manitoba. From there Pro-
f. Whidden came about ten years ago
to the Theological Department of
Acadia University. Since then he
has taken a keen interest in the
Baptist work of the Maritimes as
related to the University and also
throughout the entire constituency.
Prof. Whidden will conduct
church services during the summer
months, beginning the first Sunday
of July until the second Sunday
of August. He will also be avail-
able for other phases of pastoral
care.

Called Bennett
Empire Builder

LONDON, June 25 — (Saturday)
—(CP) Under the heading "Em-
pire Builder," the Daily Express
said editorially today that Viscount
Bennett who died Thursday night
in his Dorling, Surrey, home, "ser-
ved the Dominion of Canada and
loved the British Commonwealth
with faithfulness and tenacity."
The Daily Express was the only
London early morning newspaper
to pay editorial tribute to the peer
but the Times and Glasgow Herald
devoted column-length biographies.
Other morning papers used only
brief reports.
The Times said he was "one of
the most remarkable Canadians of
his generation, and a courageous
leader."
