The death took place in this city yesterday afternoon of Michael McGuirk of Dromore, aged 85. Mr. McGuirk had come to the city for medical treatment last May and was stopping with his daughter Mrs. Lankins, Chestnut Street, where he passed away. He had a family of thirteen children of whom seven survive him, namely, Robert on the homestead at Dromore, John and Patrick, Dromore, Frank in Boston, Mrs. Larkins, Charlottetown, Mrs. McAdam, Monaghan Road, and Mrs. Rooney, Boston. The remains will be forwarded to Dromore at 1 p.m. today, and funeral will be held at 9 a.m. Friday to Port Augustus Cemetery.

The outermost wall of the new railway wharf in this city has been completed and the cement work has been most successfully accomplished by the contractors, Reid and Archibald. The wharf will be a great deal wider than the old structure and incomparably neater and more convenient. It also projects further into the channel and will afford ample accommodation for the largest vessels. The outer wall has been stripped of its moulding boards, and the side walls are now being laid. The concrete work is most substantial in appearance being strongly reinforced with steel. The walls are stayed at frequent intervals with heavy concrete buttresses, also reinforced. A wide coping surmounts the wall, and the space within is being filled up.

A rather painful accident happened on Tuesday to P. Arthur Campbell, son of Contractor Thomas Campbell of this city who has charge of the extension of the railway line to the Surrey gravel pit on the Murray Harbor Branch railway. Mr. Campbell was by himself chopping among green hardwood through which the extension is to be laid. In the act of making a stroke his right foot slipped and the axe descending fell across the top of his instep, the keen blade making a deep cut and severing an artery. Mr. Campbell, fortunately, knew how to apply a tourniquet, and managed to stop the flow of blood and get his boot off. He then cut a stout stick and though somewhat exhausted contrived to make his way to another part of the work where his father was employed with a number of workmen. Contractor Campbell hurried to his son's assistance and Dr. Martin was summoned. The wound was stitched up and the patient came to town yesterday, to rest for a few days before resuming work.

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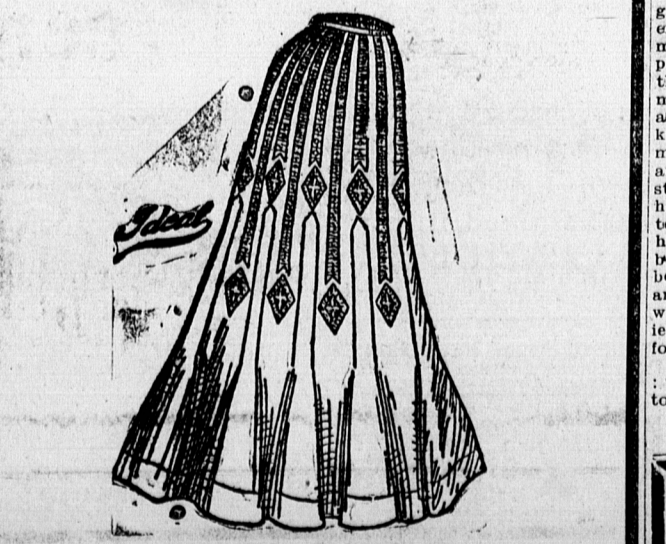
