

IMPORTANT READING MATTER SELECTED FROM THIS WEEK'S NEWS FOR THE GUARDIAN'S SATURDAY SUBSCRIBERS

WEDNESDAY

Notwithstanding the unfavorable weather of yesterday. There was a fairly large attendance at the King's County Exhibition at Georgetown. Inside the Exhibition building, the showing of roots and grain was somewhat short of last year owing to the dry season in this section of the county. The horticulture exhibit was excellent, equally as good, if not better, than that of previous years. In the Household Science Department there was a splendid exhibit of bread, cakes, and preserves. The fancy work exhibit was also good. There was a good showing of stock which was fully up to the mark in quality shown. The Exhibition was formally opened at 11 a. m. by His Honor Lieut. Gov. Rogers, who was introduced by the President of the King's County Exhibition Association, W. W. Jenkinson. Gov. Rogers in his address remarked that the exhibits of roots and grain were perhaps not up to last year, owing to the exceedingly dry season and agriculture consequently suffering from the long drought. Owing to the dry summer, the cut worm, potato bug, tussock moth and weevil were against the farmer, some of which evils it was impossible to provide against. He showed how the local exhibitions were of more advantage than if centred in Charlottetown, because in competing with neighbors, there is a chance for every farmer, and the opportunity to compete with neighbors has a capital effect on the production. He was glad the Department of Agriculture is doing its best to help the people in this work of Agriculture. From end to end of this Province, Gov. Rogers remarked, people have grown to much oats and that it is a mistake to sell away the fertility of the farmer. In conclusion he complimented the people of King's County and the Directors of the Annual Exhibition. Prof. Ross, the next speaker, gave the regrets of Mr. Richards, Com. of Agriculture who was unable to be present. Mr. Ross concurred with the opinion of Gov. Rogers that the small shows did a great deal of good. In his remarks he showed that the people should be proud of the products of their own hands—the stock exhibited is the product of those who brought them here. In convincing words he pointed out that the aim should be to instill pride into the people.

J. A. Matheson, Leader of the Opposition followed. He spoke of the trying season the farmers of King's County, but taking this into account, this exhibition should indicate great hopes for the future. He pointed out that the industrial section was growing slowly—this is not only an agricultural exhibition, but an industrial one and of different callings should be developed on all lines. 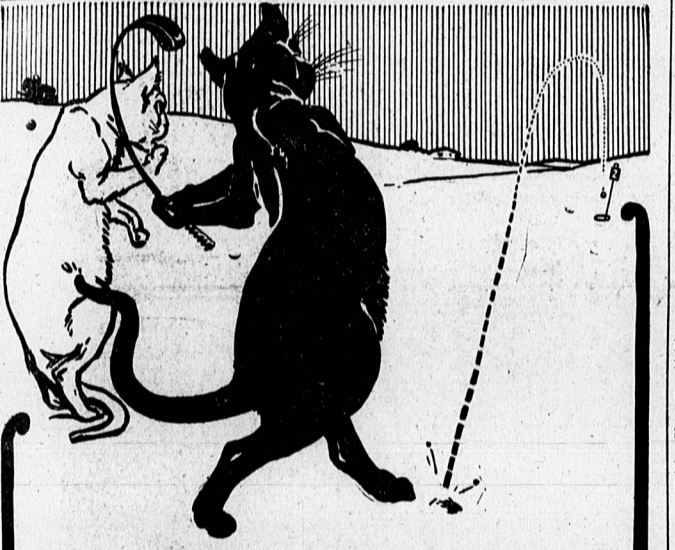
