#### A PARTIAL NEW ERA FOR P. E. I.

Sir.—A very pleasant surprise arrived with our first mail on Saturday evening for the first time this year, namely: Letter and paper mail from Halifax, St. John and Western Canada which arrived by airplane at Charlottetown on Saturday in time to connect with the Murray Harbour train for all points in Southern Queens and Kings counties which would not reach its destination otherwise till Monday and in some cases Tuesday.

For a prompt perfect Air Mail service the Post Office Department would be applauded and receive due credit by the entire populace of P. E. I. if a Daily Air Mail Service, weather permitting, were installed during the Winter season when the Car Ferry makes but one round trip per day between Prince Edward Island and the mainland. No other Provincial Capital in the entire Dominion of Canada is restricted to one round trip daily by either train or steamer for the conveyance of mail, passengers and freight in winter.

While on this subject permit me to speak a word in behalf of our new mail carrier, Mr. Kinross, B. E., No. 2, whose promptness in all kinds of weather is enjoyed by all rural box holders between Kinross Post Office, Brush Wharf and Orwell Cove. I came to P. E. I. in April, 1903, and can say without the slightest hesitation that Mr. James Martin, Kinross, is the very best rural mail carrier we have had during my twenty-five years residence in this province. It was a genuine surprise to receive our mail on Saturday only eleven hours enroute from Halifax.

#### NOT A MAN

Another, the elected leader of the band, has frequently acted as legal advisor, prosecuting counsel, and what not, for the Alliance and has received fat fees for the same. The third and noisiest member of the triumvirate would scarcely escape suspicious scrutiny anywhere; and his professed aversion to rum selling has not prevented him from renting his premises for that purpose—at a satisfactory stipend. These gentlemen, one and all, would certainly lose something valuable by a vote cast! A worse disaster to them, of course, would be the loss of the privilege they now enjoy of prying into other people's business and manipulating the thumbscrews of the legal machinery they have evolved for the annoyance and persecution of their fellow citizens. A conversion to charitable opinions on the Temperance question might make them more agreeable personally, but it would have the effect of dropping them out of the spotlight altogether. The sum total of other qualifications recommending them to public attention as hitherto manifested has been nil!
