Golden Text: Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? And who shall stand in his holy place? He that hath clean hands and a pure heart. Psalm XXIV 3-4.

ISAIAH TEACHES TRUE WORSHIP. (The Story.)

history of the prophets is of absorbing interest. From Samuel on, Othaniel, Gideon, Samson, prophets of the sword, Hosea, Joel, Amos, prophets of the pen... History of prophecy is of equal interest; the possibility and function of prophecy; how the personality of the prophet is conserved. He is not a speaking trumpet but a speaking man; not so much a mechanical predictor of future events as a man with a vision of the bearing of current events upon the future... Isaiah's excellent style is largely due to his familiarity with the Hebrew Scriptures. He quotes the hymns. Ruskin was like him in that... The ox and the ass knoweth... The Bible is the best of "Nature Books..." Except the Lord had left a "remnant" this historical fact of the "remnant" is the hope of every age, nation and Church. Society always has some "salt". There are always some who will not bend the knee. That is the only reason why the "Gates of Hell" do not prevail... Red is the most inextinguishable color. You cannot make "red white" without fairly destroying the fiber. But the alchemy of grace works the miracle. Sins red as crimson are made white as snow. Special significance attaches to the prophet's words from the fact that the princes of Israel wore crimson robes.

Isaiah almost succeeds in effacing his own personality from his message. His hock is of set purpose non-autobiographic. Over against the faint and personal notation the definiteness and power of his appeal is all the stronger by contrast. Prophetic authorship reaches its climax in Isaiah. For the number and greatness of his ideas is unsurpassed. Energy and liveliness are not wanting, yet a calm spirit of self-restraint breathes through it all. Vocabulary is rich, diction pure, images striking, antitheses sharp. Other prophets have an excellence, Isaiah has all excellences. His message is glowing, intellectual, will be glorious, imagination brilliant. He is a "fire tipped-tongue" sublimity.

Yet the prophet's style is just as subordinate to the substance of his message as his persona, history is. It is a fearful and fearless and at the same time a highly patriotic arraignment of his native land, KING, noble, priests, people are inexorably called to judgment. Charges, specifications, evidence, argument, verdict, sentence all are here. The call to confession, contrition and reformation, the proffer of forgiveness and cleansing, the assurance of peace and joy, the promise of personal and national security and prosperity, these are all here. Here one stumbles on the New Testament in the very heart of the Old Testament. Isaiah is the Fifth Evangelist.

There is a light which cannot be hid, a noble, courageous, patriotic contribution to the making of a better State. Each word uttered is provoked by some impending national peril. Isaiah deals not so much with past or future, but with the present. He deals with current events, not with ancestors or posterity, but with contemporaries. There is nothing tentative in his judgments, or equivocal in his decisions. He is fastidious yet statesman-like. Isaiah stood with his feet on earth, but his heart in eternity but mouth in time, his spirit in the counsels of God, but his person in a very definite period of human history.
