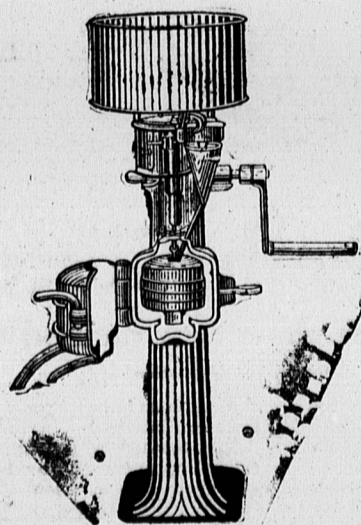

United States Restores Enemy Property

WASHINGTON, July 10.—More than \$160,000,000 of the \$500,000,000 worth of enemy property taken over by the Alien Property Custodian during the war will be returned to its original owners under the amendment to the trading with the enemy act passed at the last session of Congress.

Under the new amendment the property to be returned includes fortunes of American heiresses who married foreign noblemen, property of the German Embassy, enemy diplomat aliens who were interned, citizens of new nations and states created by the Peace Treaty, women of Allied or neutral countries who married enemy subjects and Americans held in Germany because of illness, insanity or other reason.

The amendment also permits American creditors to pursue enemy debtors by bringing claims against their property and extends privileges to pursue debtors or creditors of allied and neutral countries where such nations will grant reciprocal rights to American creditors.

In the case of citizens of free cities, states and new nations created by the peace treaty and which is no longer part of Austria, Hungary or Germany, the property will be returned subject only to the condition that their states of German or American citizenship has changed by virtue of a treaty which has been made between Germany or Austria and the United States or three or more of the following powers: Great Britain, France, Japan and Italy, or by treaties made between said nations and the United States and three of the other powers.

Montreal Gazette Epilogizes Meighen

MONTREAL, July 10.—Commenting on the resignation of Sir Robert Meighen and the appointment of a new administration by Hon. Arthur Meighen, the Montreal Gazette says editorially:

"Circumstances have long designated him as the most likely of the actual ministers to take up the heavy work of the Premiership, and revive the party enthusiasm, that has been allowed to decline. In no task that has been given to him has he failed. He has the respect of all sections of Parliament, a tribute to his capacity, industry and attention to his duties. The country can depend upon it that as he has grown with his opportunities in the past so he will grow with those which now confront him."

LIQUOR SEIZED IN OTTAWA

OTTAWA, July 10.—One hundred cases of liquor valued at \$6,000, was seized several days ago by Howard Graham, provincial license inspector, from a C. N. R. box car standing in the C. P. R. yards at Broad Street. The liquor was an unclaimed shipment which had been originally sent from Montreal to a fictitious address in Sault Ste. Marie. No one claimed it at the Soo and the shipment was being returned to Montreal when the seizure was made.

The provincial authorities were given authority by Magistrate Ask with in police court this morning to hand the shipment over to His Majesty the King.
