NO ADDITIONAL TAXATION

QUITE TRUE OF THE LIBERALS

The Patriot says, "The Government has taxed everything but the scenery." Of course they mean the Defunct Liberal Government. They didn't tax "the scenery" but they mortgaged it for a million, and if they had not been hurried from power in 1912, by this time they would have had the province hopelessly bankrupt.

Merits of Slag Given Practical Demonstration

LOCAL AGENTS TAKE DISTINGUISHED ONTARIO VISITORS ON A TOUR

Among the distinguished visitors in town yesterday were Dr. A. McGill, Chief Analyst of the Inland Revenue Department at Ottawa and Prof. Harcourt of the Guelph Agricultural College, Ontario. Their visit to Prince Edward Island at this time is in connection with the matter of fertilizers and particularly as relating to slag and the specific effect that it has on the soil. Slag is not in very much use on the farm in Ontario and on account of the necessity of reclassifying it this year at the Inland Revenue Department, due to former German standards, Dr. McNeill and Prof. Harcourt accepted the invitation of Mr. Walker, the general manager of the Cross Fertilizer Co.

The above party, through the courtesy of Auld Bros., Ltd., who are the general agents for the Island, made a tour of a large part of the Island visiting some twenty farms, under the personal guidance of Mr. R. A. MacLeod of Uigg, the local agent of Messrs. Auld Bros., Ltd., showing demonstrations of the value of slag, not only as to its merits on root crops but also on grain and grass lands.

Whatever may be the merits of slag as compared with other fertilization, the fact seems to be very apparent that it is meeting with wide use amongst the farmers and Messrs Auld Bros., Ltd., tell us that their sales of slag for the season of 1919 alone amounted to 400 tons; the total sales in the Province would be about 500 tons.

FALCONWOOD FARM

Some of the Liberal politicians are claiming that the Falconwood Farm should produce enough to maintain all the inmates and the help required on the farm.

A careful computation by a gentleman thoroughly versed in agriculture and with the requirements of the institute gives the following summary of the amount of produce required and the quantity of land necessary to produce it. It should be a revelation to those who think they could run the farm better than it is being run today:

Roller Oats—18,000 lbs.—1,058 bus. @ 17 lbs. per bus.—20 1/2 acres.
Wheat—60,000 lbs.—1,575 bus.—315 bbls. @ 5 bus. per bbl. @ 190 lbs. per bbl.—190 acres.
Beef—44,000 lbs.—125 head. Number of cattle required: 125 calves, 125 yearlings, 125 2 yr. olds., 125 3 yr. olds.—500 head.

Butter—18,000 lbs. butter—350,000 lbs. milk @ 25 lbs. per cow—33 cows.
Milk—200,000 lbs. milk @ 25 lbs. per cow—8,000 lbs. per cow per year—25 cows. Fresh milk cows—25.
Roots—For the feeding of cattle—60 acres.

Horses—Horses required for the working of the farm—40.
Hay—Hay required for horses—200 tons—100 acres.
Oats for the Feeding of Horses—5475 bus. @—109 acres.
Hay for the upkeep of cows, 1,000 tons—500 acres.
Green feed for cattle—50 acres.
Amount of pasture required—600 acres.
Garden—10 acres.
Eggs and pork are not included in the above.

Total acreage—1549 1/2.

INTERESTING INTERVIEW WITH ISLANDER WHO HAS MADE GOOD IN NEW YORK

Reverend Brother Arator of the Brothers of the Christian Schools who is at present visiting the Island to secure candidates for his Order gave a very interesting interview regarding the young men who left here 25 years ago with him to enter the religious life as members of the Christian Brothers.

All have attained to prominent positions in the Order. At present one is Professor of Mathematics in Manhattan College, another is doing very excellent work in New York Catholic Protectorate, a third is Director of one of the largest commercial schools conducted by the Brothers in New York City. When asked what he thought of the Brother's life, he smilingly replied that he intended to go back and spend another quarter of a century at the work if the Lord deigned to permit such a span of life. Then he said that a man in the religious life can be as happy as it is possible for mortals here below to be. As for the life of a Christian Brother it is one of happiness and contentment spent in the atmosphere of religion, but it is also a life of serious study and earnest devotion to the education of youth. It is a life of cheerfulness and happy association with the young; but it is also a life that requires great personal sacrifice, patience and strength of will. "As happy as a young Christian Brother" has become a by-word. But the hero who offers his life that his country may live and prosper is not more brave and courageous than the young man who voluntarily offers his life that the Kingdom of Christ may reign in the souls of the young.
