Amasa Weldon, of the I.C.R. car shops, left yesterday on a two weeks' holiday trip to different points in Nova Scotia and P. E. Island. Sydney and Ch'town will be included in the trip.—Moncton Times.

The funeral of the late Mrs L. C. Owen will take place from the residence Southport today at 2.30 to Sherwood Cemetery. Charlottetown friends will meet the ferry boat at 2.20 p. m. going to St. Paul's Church thence by train.

The Montreal Daily Herald has sent to England one of its editorial staff—Mr. J. C. Walsh—to interview English public men in regard to Mr Chamberlain's preferential trade proposals, and to estimate, as well as may be, the weight of the forces working for and against the proposition. As Mr. Walsh will naturally represent the Canadian point of view, his interviews should elicit responses peculiarly interesting to Canadians. His letters will begin in The Herald in the course of a few days.

The comet referred to in The Guardian on Thursday as having been discovered by Borelli of Marseilles four weeks ago has been seen by E. W. Taylor of this city. Mr. Taylor locates it about two-fifths of the distance between the constellation Lyrae, a sharp shaped group of stars, the brightest of which is nearly overhead at eleven o'clock p. m.—and the North Star. The comet is a hazy mass to the naked eye at present, but a prominent astronomer predicts it will be the brightest comet of the past ten years.

Mr. Kent, who has been boring for water, has ceased operations, having struck an overflow at the depth of 253 feet, which yields 50 gallons per minute or 72,000 gallons per day, which is claimed to be enough for Shediac, as 150,000 gallons will be stored in the reservoir. The water is pronounced to be of an excellent quality and the town council has been waiting for tenders for the construction of the water works, which according to plans will be a water system second to none.—Post.

A new feature this year will be a young people's summer school for the study of the Bible and missions which will be held in the forenoon from Aug. 10 to 14. Among the prominent men expected this year are Rev. Wm. Meikle, Evangelist, Glouce Bay; Prof. W. W. Andrews, Sackville; Rev. J. McLean, Ph. D., writer of Indian books; Rev. A. C. Borden, B.D., returned missionary to Japan and Rev. S. A. Chown, Toronto. Sanitary conditions have been improved and new wells dug, giving abundance of pure water. The Summer School for Sabbath School teachers and workers conducted by the Synod's Sabbath School Committee and a Committee of the Senate of the Presbyterian College, Halifax and under the supervision of the Presbytery of P. E. I. will be held in Charlottetown August 2nd to 7th next. Among other instructors Prof. Falconer of the Presbyterian College, Halifax will give five lectures, one each forenoon on "Studies in the life of Christ" and Prof. Walter C. Murray, of Dalhousie College Halifax, will give five lectures, one each evening on "The child mind." An important forward step in the church's work will be taken by the organization of a Presbyterian S. S. Association and Young People's Guild, in which it is hoped there will be a deep and wide spread interest. It is necessary that the committee should have the names of all who intend to be present not later than Wednesday, July 22nd, in order that steps may be taken to secure accommodation at as moderate a rate as possible, this being the only expense which delegates will be required to pay. Delegates travelling by P. E. I. Railway will pay one first-class fare and return free.
