success of liquor control in Manitoba. Control in Manitoba has brought about the following three great improvements: There is less drinking by both young and old; there is a higher moral tone in the community at large; it has brought about a decidedly higher respect for law.

When he visited the Northwest provinces, last year, Sir John Wiles took pains to make special inquiry into the results of the operation of the liquor laws of that part of Canada; and this is his statement: "I was wholly unprepared for the unanimity of opinion expressed in favor of Government Control. Acain and again I was told, by those who had opposed the system and voted for prohibition in plebiscites and referendums, that conditions were better under control and that they would not vote to restore the prohibitory enactments. No one suggested that bootlegging had been wholly abolished or that there was no unlawful selling of illicit drinking. They did insist that bootlegging was less common and less profitable, that the law was generally respected and enforced, that there was far less drinking in hotel bed-rooms and more undesirable places, and that there was a greater degree of social contentment and no such feeling as under prohibition that flasks must be carried and a secret store of liquor provided for dances, house parties and like events."

Barns Burned at Head of Hillsboro

A very serious fire occurred early yesterday morning about 3:30 o'clock when the large commodious barn and outbuildings of Mr. Robert Dunn, Head of Hillsboro, were completely destroyed by fire with the year's crop, machinery, etc. Mr. Dunn was away from home and on his return went to the barn to water his cattle. In doing so one of the young cattle upset the lantern and before help arrived the barns were in flames. Mr. Reuben Bambrick, the first neighbor to arrive, worked like a Trojan and it was through his efforts that the cattle and horses were saved. Others also helped valiantly to quench the flames, and keep them from further spreading. The loss is a heavy one, and there is no insurance.

Here was a mail-order leaflet as persuasive, as fetching, as any ever written by a genius in an advertising agency. No descriptive matter. No teaser copy. No four-color art.

Just the dry facts. How the money rolled in! Sometimes, though, a client was tardy in paying for a shipment. Then he received a form dangleter.

"Dear Friend: To write a collection letter is a very distasteful task for me. I wouldn't write one, were I not in need of money to purchase my supplies for coming months. May I ask you to favor me with all love awakens in us. We commit ourselves to the Son of Man in holy living and loving service, for His name's sake. Amen."

Sometimes, as in any highly competitive business, prices changed. Then revised price lists were mailed out by the thousands. Once Scotch, twenty-four quarts, "all popular brands," highest grade, eight years old—dropped to \$70. But apricot brandy ("imported, very old") and Rhine wines ("imported, very old") and Three Star Hennessy ("imported, very old") stayed at twelve quarts at \$75. Due to the persistent demand apparently.

Customers were advised: "It is much safer to send to a business location. The above prices are quoted f.o.b., New York City. Orders accepted for assorted full cases. After you have received goods and are satisfied the contents are as represented, mail us your check."

They trusted their customers. That is the modern business practice. The customer is always right, was their slogan.

When a vice-president of a Cleveland hardware supply company wrote, ordering a case of brandy, six cases of Scotch ("either

Halg & Halg or Black and White") benedictine, rye, etc., with the notation on his business stationery. "Please send the following to above address, mailing bill to me marked personal," the syndicate did as requested, saving him embarrassment, and a check was received the following week.

The orders flowed in. The checks flowed in. The "imported, very old" liquors made in venerable Manhattan flowed forth via parcel post, air mail and express.

Syndicate Heads Plead Guilty.

Then one of the syndicates was stumped by an idea. Were not, he argued, nearly all the sales made to out-of-town business men? Yes, the same type who came down to New York for "sales conferences"? Well, then!

And so all the customers on the bulky mailing list received a gold-lined envelope containing gray and red-edged cards announcing the gala opening of "New York's Newest and Most Original Supper Rendezvous—the Melody Club, 111 West Fifty-fourth Street, etc."

The announcement card is now impounded in the evidence. The club has, unfortunately, gone the way of all fleshpots.

Then the Government arrested the mail-order bartenders. The trial started. There was a panic. One of the syndicate, Joseph E. Freidman, pleaded guilty as charged. The jury was being selected, was given a sentence of two years, probation.

On the second day of the trial, Albert H. ("Al's here") Shayne and Charles P. Sakin gave up, pleaded guilty.

Shayne was given a year and a day in Atlanta prison; Sakin eighteen months. Shayne's brother, Louis P., was given a year-and-a-day sentence. They were in prison and hundreds of out-of-town customers wonder plaintively why their orders are not being filled.

But others carry the torch. Another syndicate is even now broad-casting attractive liquor price lists through the mails to wealthy Long Island residents.
