THE bodies of Ranald McDonald, Picton, chief engineer of the ill-fated Lunenburg, and James Josey, one of the crew, were taken to Picton Saturday by the Amelia. McDonald's remains were buried there at 9 a. m. yesterday and Josey's remains were forwarded to his home at Spry Bay. BEGINNING this morning a special train will be run on the P. E. I. and N. B. railway each morning to connect with the Stanley. The train will leave Sackville at seven o'clock and on the arrival of the Stanley at Cape Tormentine will leave on return reaching Sackville in time to connect with the C. P. R. going west. THE Princess left Picton about three o'clock yesterday morning on the arrival of the C. P. R. and reached here after an excellent trip about nine with C.P.R. and Halifax mails. The passengers included J. P. Woodbury; Miss Moore from Sydney; Nelson Hattenbury; Mrs. F. H. Pooler; and Mr. and Mrs. Crawford-Cardigan Bridge. The Northumberland goes over today and the Princess again tomorrow if the weather is favorable. THE people of Village Green were greatly shocked to learn on Thursday night of the very sudden death of their esteemed neighbor, Richard Jardine. He was at his work as usual all the previous day, had tea and retired without saying anything about feeling unwell. When his wife was going to retire somewhat later, she noticed by his heavy breathing and moaning that something was wrong, a doctor was immediately sent for but before his arrival Mr. Jardine had breathed his last. The funeral took place Saturday afternoon and was very largely attended. THE London correspondent of The Montreal Star speaking of the visit of Minister of Marine and Fisheries to England and the taking over by Canada of the Halifax and Esquimalt dockyards says:—Another matter arranged during Hon. Mr. Prefontaine's visit concerns the government ice breakers. Following up the report of the naval engineer, nominated by the Vickers Maxim Company, who spent two months in Canada, tenders will shortly be invited for two new ice breakers on the one of the most approved lines to maintain winter communication between P. E. Island and the mainland, and also in parts of the St. Lawrence. SUPERINTENDENT Sharp informs The Guardian that he has no doubt that gasoline cars will be in use in a short time on the Vernon River and Montague branches of the P. E. I. Railway. This will be a great convenience and undoubtedly the best way to the greatest service with least cost out of these branch lines. Such cars, built of steel to prevent telescoping are in use on the Union Pacific Railroad and are driven by a 10 horse power six cylinder gasoline engine with a "make-and-break" spark ignition, with a primary battery, to start on, and a magneto for regular running service. The cars started at low speed and the engine disconnected or thrown into high speed at will simply by turning the operating valves. Heat is supplied by circulation coils which keep the engine cool as well and the seating capacity of each car is 27.
