Musapha Kemal's bride is said to have brought him a dowry of one million Turkish liras.

American Senator Resents Alleged British Aspersions

(Special to The Guardian.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—The administration was called upon by Senator McKellar, Democrat, Tennessee, speaking in the Senate today to make "immediate demand upon the British government to disavow statements of its Chancellor of the Exchequer casting aspersions upon the American Senate and the American House of Representatives and upon the American people and lastly upon the American Debt Funding Commission."

Critical Times In Youghal

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Jan. 29.—A despatch to The Daily Express from Dublin says the rebels have destroyed the Water Works at Youghal in reprisal for the execution of two men for the possession of arms. Six thousand inhabitants are in a critical situation, as only one day's supply of food is left. The despatch adds that practically every post office in West Ireland has been destroyed, and that it is almost impossible to buy stamps or to send or receive a letter.

Crew Of Schooner Clintonia Rescued

(Special to The Guardian.) NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—The tale of heroic rescue at sea and of a desperate battle with the elements to keep a sinking vessel afloat until help arrived, was told today when the Steamship Empress of Scotland arrived with Capt. Aaron Kerley and his crew of five of the tiny schooner Clintonia of Lunenburg, N. S. The rescue was effected Friday, totally helpless in a terrific storm the Clintonia bound for Halifax from Fortune Bay, Newfoundland, was in a sinking condition when sighted by the Empress.

Opening Door To Cheap Labor

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Jan. 29.—Speaking here Saturday night Mr. Tom Moore, President of the Dominion Trades Congress, expressed his views on the Canadian immigration policy. An analysis of a statement made by Sir Edmund Walker showed that immigration policy was really the opening of the door to admit cheap labor, Mr. Moore contended.

LAUSANNE TREATY READY FOR SIGNATURE OF POWERS

Turks Show no Disposition to Accede to Allies Terms and Prepare for Fight. British Send Troops and Aeroplanes to Mosul.

(Special to The Guardian.) LAUSANNE, Jan. 29.—A draft of the proposed treaty of peace which is to be submitted to the Turks on Wednesday was distributed semi-officially to all delegates today. The document contains 160 articles, of which eight conventions are annexed. There were no developments this morning to show that the Turks were more favorably disposed to ward signing. The eight conventions deal respectively with the Mosul straits, the frontiers of Turkey, the status of foreigners in Turkey, the Albanian declaration regarding payment of the Ottoman debt, the armistice declaration and the exchange of prisoners of war between Turkey and Greece, which last two will be signed tomorrow by these two powers.

Opening Meeting Royal Wheat Commission

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Jan. 29.—The opening meeting of the Royal Commission appointed to investigate freight rates on the Great Lakes and charges that a combine has existed among the shipping companies will be held on Tuesday next. The commission is composed of Vice Chairman Mr. Simon McLean of the Dominion Railway Commission, Mr. Levi Thompson, K. C. Ex-M. P. of Quappelle, Sask., and Mr. Briggs Tremblay of Quebec. The commission will consider their itinerary on Tuesday, Mr. H. J. Symington of Winnipeg who has represented Manitoba in successive railway freight rate cases before the Dominion Railway Board, is mentioned as likely to be selected to act as chief counsel for the government before the new royal commission.

Cabinet Wants to Run no Risks in Bye-Elections

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 29.—The line of least resistance is likely to be followed in filling the cabinet vacancy caused by the death of Hon. W. C. Kenned. To transfer Hon. G. P. Graham to his old department will involve no by-election, while to promote Hon. T. A. Cramer to the Militia Department would cause a by-election in North Brantford. It is regarded as a safe seat. This plan has been under consideration from the start, and is likely to be carried out.

Mr. F. M. Woolworth Passes Away

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Jan. 29.—Frank M. Woolworth, wealthy American merchant and head of the Woolworth Company, died at the Ritz Carlton Hotel Saturday after a long illness. Mr. Woolworth was a cousin of Mr. Frank W. Woolworth, founder of the American chain of five and ten cent stores. He came to England in 1909 to open branches here. He suffered a stroke last October from which he never recovered. He is survived by his widow and a son who is a student at Yale.

BRITISH COLUMBIA LUMBER EXPORTS

VANCOUVER, Jan. 29.—Lumber exports from the Province of British Columbia will total 260,000,000 feet for 1922, according to inspection bureau estimates. Total exports for the port for the past year will exceed 4,000,000 gross tons, divided among 720 deep sea ships. Customs and excise receipts for the year approximately over \$15,000,000 nearly \$4,000,000 more than 1921.
