THE NEW STEAMER.

The other day when the item of \$175,000 to provide new ice-breaking steamers was voted in Parliament Hon. Mr. Prefontaine took occasion to explain that two new steamers are to be constructed, for the Government service, one to help out the Montcalm on the St. Lawrence in winter and to "sweep" that channel in summer; the other to ply between Prince Edward Island and the Mainland in winter. He said it is estimated that the latter will cost at least \$250,000 to \$300,000. In reply to Mr. Martin the Minister of Marine gave extended explanations showing himself to be pretty thoroughly conversant with the subject. It is not intended that the new steamer for the Island service shall be ready before a year from next November and in the meantime all the conditions during ten years past as to the winds, tides, currents, the thickness of ice etc., will be thoroughly studied, and the information turned to account in constructing the new steamer.

Mr. Martin reminded the Minister of what the Russian ice-breaker Esmack can do and of the fact that the straits of Mackinaw are navigated throughout the winter. Mr. Prefontaine replied that the conditions in the straits of Northumberland are not at all the same. The Esmack he said, cost over a million dollars when built ten years ago and was not a success. Two years later she was remodeled at a cost of nearly half a million. She had since been breaking ice in large sheets four or five feet in thickness, not fine ice such as that in the Northumberland Straits. Here also at some seasons of the year "winds prevail which make it impossible for a steamer to go through the ice properly," and he added, "no steamer in the world could be built strong enough to go through the piles which accumulated at certain points." Mr. Prefontaine did not think the new steamer would need to be a great deal larger than the Minto, but it would require more powerful machinery and more power of resistance.

Further points brought out were that the Minto and Stanley will be put in the best possible condition and continue the service during the coming winter; that it is expected to call for tenders for the new steamer for the Island service within the next two or three months; that it is hoped to have it constructed by the best builders in the world, and that it will be ready by November, 1906. The car ferry project is evidently not entertained for a moment by the Ministers, the sole idea being a strong ice-breaking steamer something after the model of those we have but with much greater strength and engine power and equipped in the latest and most approved manner for winter navigation. This is in part satisfactory, as is also Mr. Prefontaine's frank admission that no steamer can be built which can keep up a continuous service such as is promised in the terms of union.

Not quite so satisfactory was Hon. Mr. Fielding's reply to Mr. Martin in regard to the terms of union and the procuring of further data in regard to the Tunnel. Mr. Fielding claims that so far as the non-fulfillment of the terms of union is concerned the question is settled and our grievances disposed of, but if a moderate expenditure would complete the investigation in regard to the Tunnel it is desirable that it should be done. This is not an optimistic view. Probably not a single Islander can be found who thinks as Mr. Fielding does in regard to the settlement of three years ago, but we believe that he has a strong sense of justice, and we remember that in the matter of our telegraph service he at last did much better for us than he had led us to expect. We doubt not it will turn out in the same way in regard to the Tunnel. And it is not worth while quibbling about words. It is results we are after.

Togo gets \$3,200 a year and he whipped Rojevstevsky whose salary was \$65,000 a year. The Russian Admiral's salary was seventeen times as big as the Japs but the Jap would whip seventeen of him. The size of a man's salary is not always a criterion of what he is worth to the country, even in Canada.

Unexpected success is attending the efforts to raise the Russian warships sunk at Port Arthur. They are found to be less injured than had been believed. The battleship Persevet and cruiser Bayan are already afloat and the former is navigable with her own engines. It is confidently expected that the three battleships Pallada, Retvisan and Pobeda will be afloat before the middle of August. They will make a formidable addition to the Japanese navy.

The Ottawa correspondence of the Toronto Globe, which is apparently inspired, announces the probable retirement from the government a few weeks hence of Sir Richard Cartwright and Hon. Messrs Scott and Fitzpatrick. Mr. Fitzpatrick will probably accept an office. The other two gentlemen first named will remain in the Senate, drawing \$2,500 a year each as indemnity and their ministerial pensions of \$3,500 each, or \$6,000 a year for life.
