—EVANGELISTIC NOTES.— "Lord remember me when Thou comest into Thy Kingdom." These were the words on which the soldier pastor, Mr. Herman Swenson, the man of his hearers at Tuesday evening's meeting in the Baptist Church, Summerside. These were the words uttered by the dying malefactor just before he passed on into eternity. It was like the drowning man grasping at a straw but nevertheless sufficient to save him and he departed taking with him the promise of Christ, that he would be with Him in Paradise. No other would want to follow that man's footsteps as he went through life here, to do so would mean the gallows, yet he was saved but his footprints in the sands of time remained. We have only one account of the saving of a dying thief but that was sufficient to teach us that all no matter how degraded, are welcomed at the cross, and if they came they would be saved. The first thought he would emphasize then was that the Cross welcomes all. In the second place, it warns. There were two malefactors, one hanging on either side of Jesus. One was saved, but the other failed on Him and went out to an eternity of damnation. Do not put off salvation until you face death. The time to give one's heart to the Lord is in youth. Over in St. John he had heard many regret that they had not yielded themselves to Jesus earlier in life. The time to come was now. In the third place the cross divides. One malefactor was saved and the other lost forever. Evertime people face Christ, and the cross they divide some chose to follow Him, others sail on Him turn their backs, and spurn His love, yet, crucify Him. Then in the fourth place the cross reminds. It reminds us of our lost condition by nature, of the price paid for our salvation, of the folly of delay in deciding for Christ and of the blessedness of the future estate of the believer. The way of the cross leads home to God.
